Several from here attended the dance given by E. A. Howard. All report a fine time.

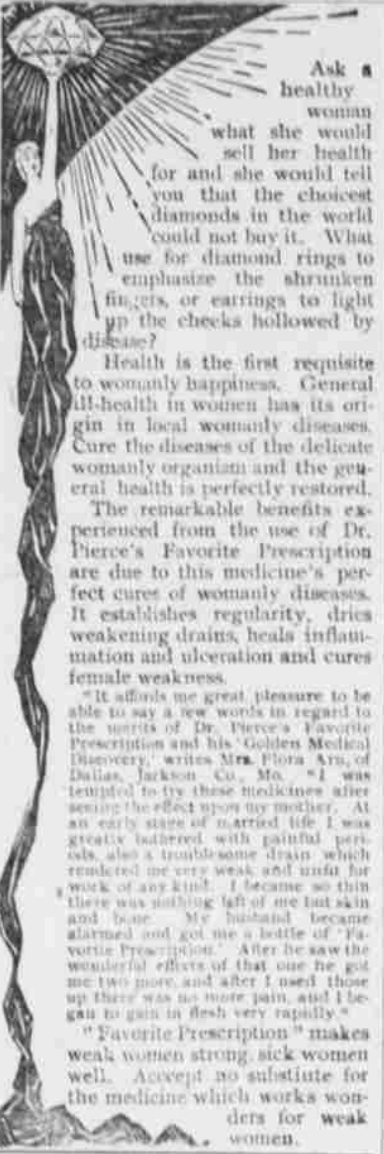
School will close this Friday here. Mr. Martice has taught a very successful term.
