Considerable drift wood is going down stream and in places along the stream people are catching the best of it for fire wood.

County Judge Ryan has forbidden the road supervisors of Clackamas county loaning the county's tools to private parties. The number of scrapers, shovels, crowbars, picks and axes that disappear from time to time amounts to considerable. Judge Ryan says, and the manner of their disappearance is by being loaned to private parties "for a day or two." Road supervisors are under bonds to take care of all the county tools placed in their possession, and the bond is usually a small one and it is nobody's particular business to enforce collection in case of loss of implements.

New Sewer District.

The city council will debate on the establishment of sewer district No. 3 at the next regular meeting Tuesday evening of next week. This district will take in 350 lots on the north side of town. The expense of digging the ditches and laying the terra cotta pipe will be about \$15,000. At present cesspools have been made to do the duty of sewers, although this section is about the oldest resident part of the city and includes the Whitlock home. The Barclay schoolhouse is also within the proposed district. There is said to be little or no opposition to the project as all the property-owners want the sewer.
