Meeting of City Council.

The city fathers met Wednesday night at the regular monthly meeting of the council and did considerable important business for the city.

The first thing of importance which was done was the passage of the ordinance for the construction of the sewer in District No. 3, authorizing the committee on streets and public property to advertise for bids.

In the ordinance was a clause authorizing the appointment of a committee to assess the property to be immediately benefited by the new sewer.

An ordinance was read for the first time changing the grades of Madison, Jefferson and J. Q. Adams streets. This is deemed necessary, so that the sewer may not have to be placed as low as it otherwise would be.

Another ordinance was read for the first time prohibiting the explosion of large fire crackers or explosives on the streets or sidewalks of the city.

Another item of business which came up was the report of the committee on streets and public property, in which it was stated that Main street, Singer Hill, Seventh and Fifth streets needed repairs. To repair these streets it was reported that 1400 yards of crushed rock would be necessary, and on Main street no less than 25,000 brick will be required. To make these improvements it will be necessary to use up all the money received and in the hands of the city road fund.

The work of constructing the south end road will commence very soon. This week Engineer Rands will hold a conference with the S. P. authorities and determine what concessions the company will make and see what are their preferences in regard to building the road, whether over or under the track. Money for building the much needed road is rapidly coming to hand and from this source no serious trouble may be anticipated. The sum of \$2500 is already available for the building of the road from Main street to 16th street, of this sum \$1000 will be obtained from the city treasury, the remaining 1500 is the sum subscribed by the citizens of the city.
