

Intelligence of the Ant.

An interesting demonstration of the intelligence of the ant was made by a student in the biological department of the University of Pennsylvania. Several hours later the student brought it out again, another morsel of cake being set at the end of the roadway. The ant thought a moment and then started for the cake over the blue path. It remembered that the red one had been hot. To prove still more conclusively that it remembered, the student next blocked up the blue path, whereupon the ant did without the cake rather than venture after it by the red one.
