WILL DESTROY PATH.—The extensive

walk that is being made by the Oregon Water Power & Railway Company be-

tween this city and the Clackamas river

will result in the destruction of the pres-

ent bicycle path leading between this

city and Portland for the entire length

of the hill or about half a mile. A new

route will have to be selected for the bi-

cycle path. The levy for a tax on bicy-

cles having been made again this year,

there will be available funds for making

the changes. Last year there was col-

lected in this county about \$185 from the

bicycle tax and this money was all ex-

pended in the construction and improve-

ment of these paths in this county. Fully

that amount will be collected from the same source this year, for, if anything, there are more bicycles in the county than a year ago.
