### TOLD IN SIDEHEAD.

**DEATH AT SPRINGWATER.**—Mrs. M. Lodema A. Keller, who died at her home near Springwater, Friday, was aged 40 years. Consumption was the cause of death and the deceased is survived by a husband and six children. Funeral services were held Sunday.

**SELENDIA STRAWBERRY.**—Mrs. Graves, of Green Point, remembered the office this week with a box of choice strawberries. The plants were sent from the famed Hood River section last October and are of the Clark Seedling variety. It was a pleasure to sample the berries, which were large, well matured and decidedly delicious.

**ON SCHOOL CONSOLIDATION.**—State Superintendent J. H. Ackerman and County Superintendent Zinner will address the people of Eagle Creek this evening on the subject of consolidation of rural districts. The patrons of Currieville and adjoining districts are interested in the proposition to consolidate districts in this county to the improvement of the course of study and the better results that follow.

**FIRE AT SCHUBEL.**—Fire on Sunday destroyed the sawmill plant and a quantity of lumber belonging to William Moehrike, of Schubel, this county. Mr. Moehrike had only recently equipped his mill with considerable new machinery and estimates his loss at \$2500, with no insurance. The fire started from a pile of burning sawdust, the flames being conveyed to the mill by the wind. Mr. Moehrike was among the sufferers in the lumber fires last fall, when his home and other buildings were burned at a loss of \$3000.

**BEGUN WORK ON FILL.**—A large force of men employed by the Oregon Water Power and Railway Company has begun making the extensive fill that has been undertaken by the company between the Clackamas river and this city. About one and a quarter miles of trestle will be replaced by dirt fill. Earth for making the fill is being obtained at Fern Ridge and transported by flat cars to the place of grading. The grade of the street car company's track when the fill has been made, will be about the same as that of the Southern Pacific railroad track.

**CONTRACT HAS BEEN AWARDED.**—Before adjourning, Friday, the county court awarded to Johnson & Andrews, of this city, the contract for building an addition to the court house and remodeling the interior of that building for \$3400. The original bid of this firm was \$4294, but an error in their estimate was discovered that made the total of the bid \$3789. The court gave the bid to the local firm for \$3400, since the next highest bid was about \$4500. Work will begin at once and the contract will be performed by September. The resignation of Miss Gussie Maddock as deputy county treasurer was accepted and hereafter the work of that department will be performed by Treasurer Cahill.

**HONORED FRATERNAL DEAD.**—Williamette Falls Camp, Woodmen of the World, of this city, conducted annual memorial services Sunday in honor of the deceased members of the local lodge. No deaths having occurred within the membership of the Oregon City lodge during the past year, there were no monuments to be unveiled, but floral tributes were distributed upon the graves of departed members in Mountain View cemetery by the members of the local camp. There are interred in the local cemetery the following deceased members: H. S. Strange, D. Stock, G. K. Fancher, J. E. Shepherd, D. D. Paine, C. Deane, J. E. Shepherd, W. C. Butts, Maurice Broderick, H. Richen and S. Shadle.

**THE LATE MRS. BARCK.**—Mrs. Margaret Barck, of Portland, died last Friday night at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Otto Dente, in this city. She was about 69 years old and had resided in Oregon for 25 years. Death resulted from a stroke of apoplexy the previous Saturday evening. Her husband died in 1882 and she leaves six daughters as follows: Mrs. Anna Jorhake, of Mount Pleasant; Mrs. Matilda Dente and Mrs. Otto Dente, of Oregon City; Miss Clara Barck, of Chicago; Mrs. Minnie Duniway and Miss Helena Barck, of Portland. Burial took place Sunday, after funeral services conducted at the First Presbyterian church in this city. A great profusion of floral offerings testified to the high esteem in which the deceased was held in this community, where she resided for so many years.

**HELD LUCKY NUMBER.**—In the annual distribution of prizes by a California paper, Chas. Albright, of this city, is one of the lucky subscribers. He has been notified that he wins a piano. Two years ago a resident of this city received \$10,-

000 from the same source. Mr. Albright is especially fortunate, and explains this good luck by saying that others who strive for the prizes are not acquainted with his system. Two years ago Mr. Albright subscribed for the paper and drew a \$50 gold watch. This year he renewed the subscription and captures a \$450 piano. A jealous rival subscriber, who has been taking the same paper for nineteen years and has not drawn so much as a postage stamp, declares that Mr. Albright's birthday falls on February 29.

**OCTOGENARIAN PASSES AWAY.**—Stout Chamberlain, who died Monday night at the home of his son, Thomas Chamberlain, at Falls View, was 87 years of age. Death resulted from old age and was contributed to by the extreme warm weather of the past week. The deceased came to California during the gold excitement of 1849, and resided in Oregon since 1876. He is survived by one son, Thos. Chamberlain. Funeral services were held Wednesday and burial was had in Mountain View cemetery.

**STOLE A BICYCLE.**—Harland Davis was arrested Tuesday, charged with the larceny of a bicycle from a resident at Canby. Davis is a barber and borrowed the wheel to come to this city, where he pawned it for \$10. Shortly after his arrest, Davis received a money order for \$20 from relatives in Washington. He has reimbursed the second-hand dealer and restored the wheel to its owner and the case was not prosecuted. Davis is said to come from a good family.

### ORDINANCE NO.

An ordinance providing for the laying and building of sidewalks on unimproved streets in Oregon City.

**SECTION 1.** The City Council may hereafter authorize the building of sidewalks, four feet in width, upon any of the unimproved streets within the corporate limits of Oregon City.

**SECTION 2.** Such sidewalks shall be constructed by laying three stringers, four by four inches in size, firmly upon the ground, which shall be first properly leveled to conform as nearly as possible to the natural contour of such unimproved streets. The size and quality of the plank to be used in the construction of such four foot sidewalks, and the manner of laying and spiking down the same shall conform in all respects to the order and manner of laying and building sidewalks of other widths in Oregon City, except that it shall not be necessary to have a curb in the building of sidewalks of four feet in width upon such unimproved streets in Oregon City, and the width of the boards shall not exceed eight inches.

**SECTION 3.** All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

### ORDINANCE NO.

An ordinance to define the fire limits of Oregon City and prohibit the erection and repair of wooden buildings within such limits.

**SECTION 1.** That the whole of Blocks numbered One (1), Two (2), Three (3), Four (4), Five (5), Six (6), Seven (7), Eight (8), Nine (9), Ten (10), Eleven (11), Twelve (12), Thirteen (13), Fourteen (14), Fifteen (15), Sixteen (16), Seventeen (17), Eighteen (18), Nineteen (19), Twenty (20), Twenty-one (21), Twenty-two (22), Twenty-three (23), Twenty-four (24), Twenty-five (25), Twenty-six (26), Twenty-seven (27), Twenty-eight (28), Twenty-nine (29) of Oregon City, Oregon, be and are hereby declared within the fire limits of Oregon City, Oregon.

**SECTION 2.** All buildings hereafter erected within the fire limits shall have their outside walls and party walls made of brick, stone or other incombustible material, and such outside walls and party walls shall extend from the foundation to the top of and through the roof of said buildings, and the roof shall be covered with tin or some other incombustible material, and the walls shall be so constructed as to separate all wood work, thoroughly and completely from all and every part of the interior and exterior of such building.

**SECTION 3.** All repairs to buildings constructed of brick, stone or other incombustible material, shall be made to conform to this ordinance.

No wooden buildings within the said fire limits shall be altered or changed without the written permission of the Chief Engineer of the Fire Department, which permit shall specify fully the alteration or change required, and no such permit shall be given if any increase will be made by the proposed change or alteration in the size of any wooden building within the said fire limits, or if such repairs or alterations will increase the value of such buildings more than thirty-three per cent.

The application therefor and a copy of each of such permits shall be filed in the Office of the City Recorder by the Chief Engineer of the Fire Department.

**SECTION 4.** No building within said fire limits shall be removed except to a portion of the same lot on which it may have stood to make room for more permanent improvements, or to a point without the fire limits and no building shall be moved into the fire limits.

**SECTION 5.** Whenever any building shall be by any means so much injured as to be, in the judgment of the Chief Engineer of the Fire Department a dangerous nuisance, or when any wooden building within the fire limits shall, in the judgment of the Chief Engineer of the Fire Department, be damaged to the extent of one-half or more of its actual value, the Chief Engineer of the Fire Department shall immediately cause to be served upon the owner or person having control thereof, a notice requiring such owner or person to remove said damaged building forthwith, and the owner or person receiving such notice shall, within ten days after receiving the same, comply with the requirements thereof.

**SECTION 6.** Dwelling houses as defined in this ordinance are exempted from the provisions of this ordinance.

The term dwelling house shall only apply to buildings erected for and used exclusively as a family habitation and shall not apply to buildings occupied by more than two families.

**SECTION 7.** The provisions of this ordinance shall apply to the owners of all buildings, situated within the limits prescribed in section one of this ordinance, the agent of said owners, the occupants of said buildings and the builders and contractors of all buildings in course of construction or repair within said limits and any owner, agent, occupant, builder, contractor or person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof before the Mayor or Recorder be punished by a fine of not less than Twenty-five Dollars or more than One Hundred Dollars or by imprisonment in the city jail not more than ninety days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, and the continuance or maintaining of such violation shall be deemed a new offense for each day on which the same is so continued or maintained and shall be punished accordingly.

**SECTION 8.** The Chief Engineer of the Fire Department is directed to see that the provisions of this ordinance are enforced.

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
