#### TOLD IN SIDEHEADS.

**WILL BUY ROAD MACHINERY.**—The Clackamas county court is negotiating for the purchase of a combined rock crusher and road roller as a means of further promoting the building of good roads in this county. At the present time the county is poorly equipped with road building machinery.

**JACKSON STREET IMPROVEMENT.**—The city council Monday night awarded to John Bittner, of this city, the contract for improving Jackson street for \$7044.29. The contract calls for the grading of the street for a distance of eight blocks with crushed rock. Harry Jones, also of this city, was the only other bidder. His proposal was for \$7880.18.

**REMEMBERED THE NEEDY.**—Oregon City people subscribed \$222.50 in cash for the relief of the Heppner flood survivors and the amount has been forwarded to the proper disbursing committee. In addition to this cash subscription by the residents of this city, the management of the Oregon City Manufacturing Company subscribed \$190 worth of blankets for the needy of Heppner.

**HAS STATION AT BORING.**—The Oregon Water Power & Railway Company established an office at Boring Monday morning. Construction of the company's road bed to this point has been finished and a freight depot and other necessary buildings will be constructed there by the company in a short time. J. E. Noble, of this city, has been appointed agent for the company and assumed charge of the office Monday.

**TEACHERS AT PARKPLACE.**—The board of directors for the Parkplace school last week held the annual election of teachers. Prof. H. L. McCann was re-elected principal and Mrs. Buck and Miss Childs were retained as grade teachers. Miss Wilson, recently from Michigan, and Miss Thompson, a graduate of the Ashland Normal school, were named to succeed Miss Williams and Miss Marshall who had resigned.

**PROF. GRAHAM AN ARTIST.**—The Marquand Grand Theatre in Portland last Saturday night was hardly large enough to accommodate the many friends and admirers of Prof. William Wallace Graham, of this county. They had assembled to enjoy a concert given by Mr. Graham. Gifted and accomplished he was before going to Europe, a six years' study under the great masters has developed Prof. Graham into a masterful performer. The length of the excellent program was doubled by the repeated encores that were responded to. Mrs. Rose Block Bauer sang a number of selections and Prof. Edgar Courson accompanied the violinist.

**GREAT AMOUNT OF TRAVEL.**—The sale of tickets in the Oregon City office today has been the largest of any average day in years," said C. B. Frissel, local agent of the Southern Pacific Company Monday afternoon. "It was just a year ago this month that the fare in this state was reduced from 4 to 3 cents per mile, and in spite of the reduction the aggregate of the receipts of the office is larger than a year ago. The receipts of this office from the sale of tickets is continually increasing." Local travel was never better than at the present time. Each outgoing and incoming train is comfortably filled and frequently crowded. An increased settlement of this section of the state, coupled with the more prosperous conditions now prevailing here, are responsible for this condition in transportation circles.

Company and the boats but the

deal was not concluded until last Saturday. The new arrangement will be to the decided advantage of tourists to this section of the valley in that they will be enabled to make the trip one way by boat and return by the car. Assistant Superintendent Fields, of the O. W. P. & Ry. Company, announces that the company will provide a free entertainment at Canemah Park every Sunday throughout the summer. An organization of colored jubilee singers and instrumentalists was the attraction last Sunday.
