### FELL BENEATH THE CARS

Arthur Knepper, an Employee of the O. W. P. & Ry. Co., Loses Life.

Arthur Knepper, who was employed on the construction force of the Oregon Water Power & Railway Company, lost his life at Boring Sunday evening by falling beneath a gravel train. Three heavily loaded cars passed over his body at the west killing him almost instantly. Knepper was a single man about 24 years of age and has no relatives in this section.

Coroner Holman, in response to a message, went to the scene of the accident Monday morning and conducted an inquest over the body. The investigation showed that Knepper was attempting to operate a brake when he lost his balance and fell beneath the cars. Blame for the accident was not placed on anybody by the jury which found that death resulted from an unfortunate accident.

### MRS. MILLER DEAD

#### One of Oregon City's Accomplished Citizens is Called.

#### Deceased Was a Woman of Exceptional Accomplishments.—Funeral Sunday.

A feeling of deepest sorrow among Portlanders attended the announcement Saturday morning of the death at Salem the night before of Mrs. Robert A. Miller, of this city. About two weeks ago Mrs. Miller went to Salem for a short visit and while there was seized with a severe illness that required submission to the surgeon's knife for its proper treatment. The operation was performed last Thursday and death resulted at 11 o'clock Friday night. Sarelis Griffith was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. C. Griffith, of the Waldo Hills, Marion county, where she was born 45 years ago. Her education was acquired in the public schools and an attendance at Willamette University in Salem from which institution she was graduated in the class of 1877. In the following year she was wedded to Quincy A. Grubbe, who died subsequently of consumption. Mrs. Grubbe engaged at school teaching and for a number of years very satisfactorily filled the office of city superintendent of the Salem public schools. Her resignation from that capacity in 1893 was attended by the adoption of resolutions of regret by the members of the Salem school board. During that year she became the wife of Robert A. Miller who survives her and has the sympathy of the entire community in his irreparable loss and the hour of deepest bereavement. Following the marriage, the deceased and her husband have been continuous residents of this city.

Mrs. Miller was a woman of culture and refinement and possessed of rare accomplishments. Gifted with more than ordinary intellectual ability she ranked among the prominent educators of the state. Hers was a life of great usefulness and with her sweet and lovable disposition, it was only to know her to like her. For a number of years Mrs. Miller was president of the state organization of Native Daughters and at the time of her death was prominently connected with the State Women's Clubs. For many years she was a devoted student of Shakespeare and for a long time acted as president of the Oregon City Shakespeare Club for the organization of which she was responsible. The occasion for the visit of Mrs. Miller to Salem at this time was to give a Shakespearean reading before the Salem Women's Club. Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at Salem and interment was had in the Waldo Hills cemetery.
