## THE LOCAL NEWS.

Marriage licenses were this week issued by County Clerk Sleight as follows: Pearl Ream and Manley Manning, Maggie Webster and Royal Sprague, Elva M. Looney and J. H. Looney.

The Lord's Supper will be commemorated at the Congregational church next Sunday morning. In the evening the service will be of a patriotic nature. The choir is preparing a number of special and appropriate selections for the occasion.

The Oregon City Band will give a grand ball at the Armory Saturday night, July 4. Special arrangements are being made by the band boys for the party, which is given for the benefit of the organization. All interested in maintaining a good band should attend the dance and encourage the musicians.

The farmers of the Highland neighborhood have formed a baseball team and are preparing a diamond upon which they expect to hold many a hot contest this summer. These grangers declare they have the best amateur team in these parts and will bar no other organization that seeks a game with them.

Homestead purchase patents were received at the Oregon City land office Wednesday in favor of the following named parties: Heirs of Esther P. Collins and Alvin Clark. Business of all kinds in the local land office has fallen off perceptibly during the past fortnight. The first contest case to engage the attention of the officials for several days was heard Wednesday.

The aggregate of the receipts of County Recorder Stevens for the month of June was \$262.65 as against \$212.75 for the corresponding month a year ago. In the office of County Clerk Sleight, the receipts amounted to \$262, while for the same month last year only \$205.35 was received. In the month that has just closed 25 marriage licenses were issued as against only 15 for the same month a year ago.

Father Hildebrand, rector of St. John's Catholic church of this city, took out his final citizenship papers Wednesday. Rev. Hildebrand leaves next week for a visit to his old home at Westphalia, Germany. Without evidences of American citizenship in his possession a native of Germany who visits his native land from this country is liable to detention for military service. In taking out his final papers, Father Hildebrand provides for this contingency and avoids a possible protracted stay in his native country.

The Oregon City Water Commission held a meeting Wednesday night when J. E. Hedges, the newly-elected member, took his chair, succeeding T. L. Charman. In the election of officers, C. H. Canfield was made president, J. E. Hedges, secretary; W. H. Howell, superintendent; T. L. Charman, collector. The third member of the board is W. B. Zomwalt. Patrons of the city water works may continue to pay their monthly assessments to Mr. Charman at the drug store.

Canby Camp Meeting will hold its annual session July 5 to 12, 1903, on the old camp ground at Canby, Oregon. There will also be held in connection with the camp meeting, the annual session of the Salem District Ministerial Association. A most enjoyable and profitable time is expected. Everybody invited. Free gate. The Southern Pacific Company has made special rates for persons attending, who, on paying their fare to Canby, will be given a receipt, which will entitle them to return tickets at one-third fare.

During the week three new suits have been filed in the circuit court. Alfred W. Snyder, who married Malinda at Stayton, Marion county, in April 1900, desires a legal separation on the grounds of desertion. Stella London asks to be divorced from James London to whom she was wedded at Hubbard in 1894. The separation is asked on the grounds of desertion and plaintiff, who is represented by Story and Dimick, asks for the custody of the only child, aged 7 years. C. Schebel, guardian for Edward Hornschuch, a minor, has instituted a suit against Carl Rieman et ux, to have set aside the deed by which Guentherina Hornschuch, now deceased, transferred to Rieman lot 2 block 1, Fairview addition to Oregon City. The complaint alleges that in consideration of the transfer of the property, the defendants agreed to cause for the grantor and the minor plaintiff for their lives. This it is claimed Rieman refuses to do. The property involved is of the estimated value of \$900. U'Ren and Schubel appear for the minor Hornschuch.

On last Sunday afternoon, in the presence of a number of the immediate friends and relatives of the contracting parties, Manly M. Manning and Pearl May Ream were married. The wedding occurred at the bride's home at Willamette Falls, and the nuptial knot was tied by Rev. Bollinger of the Congregational church. A magnificent dinner was served and the occasion was one long to be remembered by the gathered friends of the groom and bride. ## MOLALLA PEOPLE WERE EXCITED.

Discovery of a Human Skeleton, Belonging to a Student, Was Cause.

The discovery by neighbors Tuesday of parts of a human skeleton on the Nelson farm near Molalla, this county, caused a great sensation among the people of that section of the county. Disintegration of the flesh from the bones was not complete and the discoverers figured that they had unmistakable evidence of a murder. Coroner Holman, of this city, was notified and an investigation of the find completely exploded the murder theory.

Fred Nelson, deputy Clackamas county assessor, is improving his spare time in the study of medicine and in the earnest application to his textbooks, was ignorantly responsible for the sensation. He recently procured a cadaver that he took to his farm near Molalla where he was reducing the same into a skeleton as an aid in his study of human anatomy. The reported discovery caused not a little excitement.
