LOCAL SENSATIONAL GAME

Monograms, of Portland, Captured Sunday's Game from Oregon City.

In the most exciting game of the season, Sunday afternoon at Canemah Park, Oregon City lost to the Monograms, of Portland, by the score of 2 to 1. Hoyt, for the visitors, was hit freely, but his support was strong and score-making by the locals was an impossibility. Letto pitched in good form and gave the Monograms but four hits, Oregon City getting five hits off of Hoyt. With the addition of several players from Portland, the Oregon City nine was strengthened. The Giles brothers played at second and third bases, Rankin filled short stop, Sharkey was in center field. At two stages of the game, in the second and third innings, with two men out and all bases occupied, Hopp came to the bat for the locals but failed to deliver the goods. The game being tied at Oregon City but the home team failed again to get what they were entitled to, nine errors during the game contributing to that result. But two errors were recorded against the Monograms. Rankins, of Portland, gave satisfaction as umpire.

JAPS WERE OUT FOR BLOOD.

Incensed at the Bombardment of Their Box-Car Homes.

Ernest Smith, of Canemah, was the innocent victim last Thursday evening of a mob of angered Japanese workmen. He narrowly escaped violent treatment at the hands of a mob that was only dispersed by the timely intervention of Assistant Superintendent C. G. Fields, of the Oregon Water Power & Railway Company.

Japanese numbering about 100 are employed on the construction force of the Southern Pacific Company, and live in box-cars stationed in the company's switch-yards in this city. Several boys assaulted the cars with rocks. The foreigners swarmed from the cars, but the assistants had escaped and the incensed Japs made for Smith, who chanced to be passing the cars.

The workmen were armed with revolvers and dirks, and until the arrival of Assistant Superintendent Fields, who was a passenger on a passing street-car, held control.
