Sheriff's Sale on Execution.

In the circuit court of the state of Oregon, for the county of Clackamas. The Bank of Oregon City Plaintiff, vs. William T. Whitlock and Annie H. Whitlock, Defendants.

By virtue of a judgment order, decree and an execution, duly issued out of and under the seal of the above entitled Court, in the above entitled cause, to me duly rected and dated the 22nd day of May, 1903, upon a judgment rendered and entered in said court on the 12th day of January, 1898, in favor of The Bank of Oregon City, Plaintiff and against William T. Whitlock and Annie H. Whitlock, Defendants for the sum of \$440, with interest thereon at the rate of 10 per cent. per annum from the 1st day of January, 1897, and the further sum of \$75 as attorney's fee, and the further sum of \$10 costs and disbursements, and the costs of and upon this writ, commanding me out of the personal property of said defendants, and if sufficient could not be found, then out of the real property belonging to said defendants on and after the date of said judgment to satisfy said sums as above set forth and also the costs upon this writ.

Now, therefore, by virtue of said execution, judgment order and decree, and in compliance with the commands of said writ, being unable to find any personal property of said defendant's, I did, on the 22nd day of May, 1903, levy upon the following described real property of said defendant as, situate and being in the County of Clackamas, and State of Oregon, to-wit: The following described premises situate being a portion of the Donation Land Claim of Ezra Fisher and wife the same being known on the maps and plats of the United States surveys as subdivision No. 832 certificate No. 407 and claim No. 44 in sections 28, 29, 32 and 33 of township two south of range two east of the Willamette Meridian, to-wit: Beginning at a point which is 30 chains south 1 degree west from the north west corner of said claim and running thence north 84 degrees 25 minutes east 2.50 chains; thence north 1 degree west 5.50 chains; thence north 84 degrees 25 minutes west 2.50 chains; thence north 1 degree east 5.50 chains to the place of beginning containing 1.37 acres.

Also—Beginning at a point 2.50 chains south 84 degrees 15 minutes east from a point which is 20 chains south 1 degree west from the north west corner of said claim; running thence south 1 degree west parallel with the west line of said claim 5.50 chains; thence south 85 degrees 57 minutes east 3.15 chains; thence north 1 degree west parallel with the north line of a tract of land sold to John Naught by N. sun be represented by a globe two feet in diameter. A grain of mustard seed at the circumference of a circle 164 feet in diameter will adequately represent the size and distance of Mercury. Mars will be adequately represented by a pinhead at 654 feet, and the asteroids by grains of sand 1,000 to 1,200 feet away. An orange at the distance of half a mile will stand for Jupiter, a very small apple at four-fifths of a mile will stand for Saturn and a cherry on the circumference of a circle 1 1/2 miles across will represent Uranus.

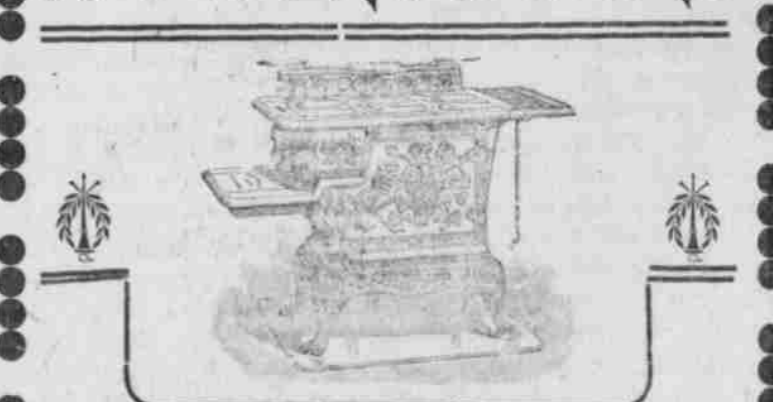
