TOLD IN SIDEHEADS.

NEW BRIDGE OVER CLACKAMAS—A crew of bridge constructors in the employ of the Southern Pacific Company has about completed the removal of the company's bridge across the Clackamas river just below this city. The old structure will be replaced by an elegant modern steel bridge of attractive design, costing several thousand dollars.

SOME BUSINESS CHANGES—During the week Stonehill J. Vaughan sold his half interest in a local livery stable to Harry Moody. The consideration is reported to have been \$1250. George Korten, who for several months has been conducting the postoffice cigar store, has disposed of the same to a Mr. Wilson, of Portland, who has taken charge.

WOOD CHOPPER BECOMES INSANE—Wm. Pike, aged 40 years, was taken to the insane asylum at Salem Tuesday night. Pike has been an inmate of the Clackamas county jail for several weeks, having been held from the justice court to the circuit court for a misdemeanor. Pike was employed as woodchopper for the Willamette Pulp & Paper Company.

PREPARING FOR CHAUTAUKA—The Southern Pacific Company is having the old platform at the Chautauqua grounds removed and is substituting therefor one of granite sand. Arrangements have also been made by the railroad company for keeping an operator at the Chautauqua depot during the 13 days' Assembly, for the accommodation of the general public.

INSPECTED BRIDGES—The members of the Clackamas county court went to Needy Wednesday, where they were joined by the Marion county court and proceeded on an inspection of the various bridges over Pudding river and Bottle creek that are jointly owned by the two counties. A number of these structures are reported to be in various degrees of repair, and will be properly strengthened and placed in condition for travel.

FREEMAN WON THE FIGHT—Frank Freeman went to Albany last Friday, where, in the evening, he was given the decision over a local boxer named McDaniel at the close of the fourth round in what was to have been a ten round contest. The bout was the first boxing contest ever held in Albany and was liberally patronized. The Herald, in its report of the event, says there were several ladies in the audience while leading business men and professional men of the city were to be seen on the front seats.

PORTLAND PARTIES DIVORCED—Gus Brill, of Portland, was divorced Wednesday from Emma Brill on the grounds of alleged cruel treatment and other indignities. By the terms of a stipulation the defendant is awarded the residence property occupied by the parties in East Portland, and the custody of the three minor children for the support of which the plaintiff has to pay \$15 per month until they attain their majority. The parties were married at Vancouver, Washington, in February, 1895, and the alleged cruel treatment dates from the year following the marriage. Both parties now reside in Portland.

RAIN INJURES FRUIT AND GRAIN—The continued rain of the last few days has practically ruined the cherry crop. The Royal Anne variety, of which there is an abundant crop, has been rendered unmarketable, the fruit having cracked badly and is now fermenting on the trees. If the rain does not cease soon, extensive damage will result to hay and grain throughout the county. With a change to favorable weather conditions, Clackamas county will this year yet harvest one of the most bountiful crops that was ever raised.

BASEBALL GAME CALLED OFF—The game of baseball between the Dayton and Oregon City nines announced for Sunday has been cancelled because of the inability of the up-valley team to secure a river steamer with which to give an excursion to this city. An attempt was made to get a game with the Cinemaw Indians but the Redskins decline to play on Sunday. Manager Shark, of the local team, will go to Portland Thursday and if possible arrange for another game with the Monograms to be played in this city next Sunday.

WILL BE A TEST CASE—Mrs. Kate L. Newton, of this city, was arrested Wednesday under the provisions of city ordinance for failing to make required sewer connections in Sewer District No. 2. She pleaded not guilty in the city recorder's court and the trial has been set for July 30. This is the first arrest under the ordinance which authorizes the arrest and fining of property owners who neglect to connect with sewers in their respective localities and the case will likely be a test one. H. E. Cross has been retained by the defendant. Other arrests on the same charge will probably be made within a few days.

HAND INJURED BY SAW—W. Poindexter, an employe in a local planing mill, had his left hand badly lacerated Friday morning by having the same come in contact with a hand saw that he was operating. The first two fingers were almost severed.

DEATH AT PARKPLACE—Mrs. Emma B. French, aged 44 years, died at the family home in Parkplace, a suburb of this city, last Thursday night, of consumption. The deceased came to this city from Dakota about four years ago. She leaves a husband and four children. Funeral services were held Friday afternoon and interment took place in Mountain View cemetery near this city.

NEW GRANGE ORGANIZED—Dr. J. S. Casto, state deputy master Patron of Husbandry, reports the recent organization at Harlow of the Twentieth Century Grange with W. W. Jessen, master and Miss Bessie Shepherd, secretary. The next meeting of this local grange will be held July 29. There are now eighteen granges in Clackamas county and Pomona Grange met with the Milwaukee Grange Wednesday, July 8.

HOWARD STOCK ASSIGNMENT—Mrs. E. J. Howard, wife of George T. Howard, the grocery man, who left this city three weeks ago because of financial troubles, has made an assignment in favor of the creditors. Howard recently conferred on his wife the power of attorney and in that capacity the assignment was made. County Judge T. E. Ryan was named as the assignee, and has taken charge of the stock and other available assets. An inventory of Howard's grocery stock and other property shows the assets of the estate to be about \$4500. Claims against Howard will aggregate \$9000.

DELINQUENT TAX SALE—Monday Sheriff Shaver conducted a sale of all property that was bid in by the county for delinquent taxes for the year 1899. This sale was conducted under the provisions of a law enacted by the state legislature in 1901, which authorizes counties to sell, at public auction to the highest bidder all property that is acquired by the county at delinquent tax sale, when the time for redemption shall have expired. The property sold in this county Monday represented taxes amounting to about \$2500 which, with the accrued interest and penalty charges, aggregated \$3250.

HOP CROP WILL BE LIGHT—Estimates as to probable hop yield in Clackamas county this year are conflicting. A conservative estimate places the crop at not to exceed fifty per cent. of last year's yield. Many yards will not produce more than a third of the crop of last year while hill yards will yield better. An unprecedented number of missing hills in nearly every yard is reported. The large per centage of unproductive vines in Clackamas county yards is not explained for the reason that the season has been favorable to the growth of the crop. No lice or other pest have appeared in this county.

QUEEN ELEANOR I—Miss Eleanor Williams, of this city, was elected to represent the Oregon City Woodmen at the Carnival to be held in Portland July 14-25. The voting at the close of the contest, which ended with the counting of the ballots Wednesday morning, was spirited though good natured. The vote cast for the different candidates was as follows: Miss Williams, 951; Miss Samson, 519; Mrs. Darling, 528; Miss Marshall, 145. The successful candidate will be furnished her regal robes and entertainment while in Portland and has the privilege of naming two maids to accompany her and they will also be entertained while the guests of the Portland carnival committee.

RECEIPTS WERE VERY LIGHT—The aggregate of the receipts of the Oregon City land office from all sources for the month of June was \$124.34. This is the smallest amount of money that has been received at the local land office for any other one month in four years. Last month the total of the receipts was \$8000, while for the two months preceding more than \$13,000 each month was taken in. The receipts of the office for several months immediately preceding June range from \$8000 to \$19,000. Explanation for this decrease in the receipts is found in the fact that all completed homestead filings are being held up pending an investigation that is being made by the government. Because of this, the proving up on these claims has been almost entirely suspended. During the month of June there were four timber land entries, 59 homestead filings, representing 8664.30 acres, one final homestead proof, and forty timber land applications. The aggregate of business of all kinds that was transacted in the Oregon City land office last month was considerable less than for any other one month in years.

FOR PROTECTION OF FARMERS.
Representative Shelley's Warehouse Bill Went Into Effect July 1.

House Bill No. 75, passed during the last session of the legislature, and which provides for the regulating and licensing of the business of storing grain for hire, and requiring the furnishing of properly approved undertakings, went into effect on July 1. Under the new law the balilee or baliee, before engaging in the business of storing grain, belonging to any other person, whether for compensation or otherwise, shall procure a license from the county court of the county in which such business is to be located, the license to be conspicuously displayed in some part of the building used as a warehouse. The county court is to fix the amount of, and to require annually from the persons securing the licenses, an undertaking, the amount to be not less than \$1000, nor more than \$50,000. After the undertaking is approved by the county court, it is to be recorded in the county commissioner's court journal.

On June 15, of each year, a statement must be filed with the county clerk, showing the quantity of grain in store, also a statement of the quantity of grain represented by outstanding warehouse receipts. These statements are filed for the benefit of the public and shall be open to inspection.

The new law is a result of the many shortages which have occurred in different warehouses during recent years, and was passed to protect the farmers against future loss.
