TOLD IN SIDEHEADS.

RECEIPTS AT LAND OFFICE.—The receipts of the Oregon City Land Office for the month of September amounted to \$186.00. From 30 homestead filings \$375 was received while during the month only 19 timber land applications and final proof were allowed, contributing \$190 to the receipts of the office. Commissions were received for 9339.14 acres and commissions were issued for 12 final homestead proofs, the fees aggregating \$72.

DIED OF PARALYSIS.—Mary E. Veteto, aged 64 years, died at her home at New Era Friday morning of paralysis. Born in an eastern state, Mrs. Veteto came to Oregon in 1877 locating at New Era in the following year. She is survived by a husband and three children, viz: Riley O. Veteto, of Mayville, Ore.; Elmer F. Veteto and Mrs. Eva Critcher, of New Era. Funeral services were conducted Saturday afternoon at Zion Cemetery near Canby where interment took place.

AN OLD DEED DISCOVERED.—County Clerk Sleight, in renovating his office records recently, discovered a document of historical interest. It is in the form of a warranty deed executed by John McLaughlin, prominent in early Oregon history, in favor of W. W. Buck to whom was transferred block 66, Oregon City. The date on which the instrument was executed is September 12, 1851, and the consideration named is \$2400. The attractive residence of C. G. Huntley, a local druggist, now occupies the ground included in the transfer.

FISHING FOR SALMON.—Local fishermen find great sport this fall fishing for salmon in the Willamette river near this city. Splendid specimens of the salmon family of the different varieties are caught daily. At this season of the year the salmon are even more game than usual and afford genuine sport in capturing them. Some have been caught recently at the mouth of the Clackamas, which is the favorite fishing grounds in this section. That will measure two feet and weigh 10 pounds. The average weight of the salmon that are being caught, however, is about 2½ pounds.

BAD BOYS FROM PORTLAND.—Chief of Police Burns on Sunday took into custody two incorrigible lads of Portland, and returned them in the afternoon to the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society, from which they are runaways. The boys gave their names as Roscoe Potter and George Oliver Bozorth, of 264 Jefferson street and 288 Front street, Portland, respectively. Chief Burns says the pair is a bad one and reports that their true names and places of residence were only obtained after a severe questioning, in which the lads were caught in numerous falsehoods.

DID NOT CONSIDER KENNEDY CASE.—The Congregational Association, which concluded its sessions in this city last Thursday night, took no action of any kind towards Rev. Kennedy, of Hillsboro, who is charged with burglary. Rev. Kennedy, being a pastor in the service of that denomination, it was expected that the state association might take some action in his case expressive of the general opinion as to the guilt or innocence of the accused. While no formal action was taken by the association, some of the delegates did not hesitate to discuss the subject. While they would not indicate whether they thought Rev. Kennedy guilty of the crime with which he is charged, they take the position that if he is guilty he should be punished.

MORE LITIGATION.—Three suits were instituted in the Clackamas county circuit court Saturday. E. F. Riley has begun a suit against M. F. Parrish to quiet title to lots 1-12 inclusive and lots 36, 37 and 38, block 96, Minthorn's addition to Portland. Anna E. Layman, of Portland, in a suit filed today seeks to be divorced from James M. Layman to whom she was married in Portland in September 1892. Desertion in Wallace, Idaho, in 1901 is alleged as the grounds for asking for a separation. The plaintiff also asks for the custody of three minor children. The State Land Board has brought an action against Emma Fitzgerald to determine the title to 231.60 acres in 3 r 3 e in Clackamas county. In the last named case, Attorney General Crawford for the state will be assisted by U'Ren & Schnebel, of this city.

NOW HAVE BLOODHOUNDS.—Two bloodhounds have been received from Kentucky at the Oregon State Penitentiary. They are young and untrained, and they have been turned over to Luis Savage, one of the guards who will take them in hand. Mr. Savage is a good hand with dogs, and he expects to soon have the new arrivals to be of service in tracking

convicts, in case any get away from the institution. These hounds are only pups, but they are from the best Kentucky and Tennessee stock, and when they are properly trained will be of the best in the country.—Salem Statesman.

NEW GRANGE ORGANIZED.—J. S. Castro, state organizer for the state grange, reports the organization at Neely of a new grange having a charter membership of 40. Robert Glinther is the master and John F. Wachtman will serve as secretary.

WAS WELL KNOWN HERE.—Oregon City people were shocked Tuesday morning by the receipt of a telegram by J. Nelson Wisner, announcing the accidental drowning in the Columbia river, near White Salmon, Monday evening, of Geo. S. Gilstrap, who formerly resided in this city. Mr. Gilstrap will be remembered as the barber who was employed for four years by E. L. Johnson at the O. K. parlors, resigning his place there in July, 1902, to accept a place at the fish hatchery on the Columbia river. It was while discharging his duties that the popular young man lost his life. Gilstrap was aged about 32 years, and is survived by a wife and one son. He was a member of the local tent, Knights of Maccabees, in which he carried \$500 insurance. The deceased was highly esteemed in this city, where he had a wide circle of friends who are grieved at his untimely death.

NORTH PACIFIC UNITARIAN CONFERENCE.—The second annual session of the North Pacific Unitarian Conference will be held in the First Unitarian church, Spokane, Washington, Tuesday evening October 27, to Thursday evening, October 29, inclusive. The conference sermon will be preached Tuesday evening by Rev. George Crawshaw, D. D., minister of the church of Our Father, Portland, Oregon. Business will be transacted Wednesday morning and various reports submitted. Wednesday afternoon will be given to a consideration of religious education in church and home. And upon Wednesday evening there will be a platform meeting with three addresses upon the Unitarian Attitude toward Orthodox churches, toward the Unchurched and toward the Irreligious. Thursday morning will offer papers and discussions upon the liberal churches in the Northwest. A public meeting with closing sermon and addresses will be held on Thursday evening.

The first quarterly meeting at the Dover church will be held Saturday and Sunday.

#### Weight of a Growing Child.

The weight of a growing child is the most important index to its general health. The standard of weight for growing children, that usually given by authorities in the matter, is that at five years of age a child should weigh about as many pounds as it is inches high. As a rule, this will not be much over or under forty pounds. Children who come of large parents should weigh something more than that. The rate of increase should be about two pounds for every inch of growth, with a tendency for the weight to exceed this standard proportionately rather than to fall below it. When a child is rather heavier in proportion to its height than this standard it is a sign of good health. If the child is growing rapidly it should not be allowed to fall much below it without being made to rest more than has been the custom before. A deficiency of weight in proportion to height is always an unfavorable sign. Any interruption in the progress of increase of weight, especially during the continuance of growth, must be a danger signal that should not be neglected by those interested in the patient.
