The corporation will commence business with a capital stock of \$6000 and arrangements have been made for the erection of suitable buildings in which the company expects to begin operations about February 1. The plant will be located on the property of Mr. Harris on Twelfth street where a deep well, that was recently bored, will furnish a supply of water for the manufacture of the ice.

Claudius Wallich, superintendent of the United States Fisheries Station at Oregon City, reports that the combined catch of the hatcheries under his management for the season that has just closed aggregated 47,490,000 Chinook salmon eggs. The catch this season is far in excess of that of a year ago and was made possible by the aggressive work of the fish culturists of this state in past seasons. By reason of the methods that have been employed in the past, Mr. Wallich reports that the Chinook salmon in increased numbers have been returning annually to the same grounds for spawning purposes. In order to relieve the congested condition that exists at the Little White Salmon Hatchery from five to seven shipments of 1,000,000 eggs each, will be made to the state hatchery at Salmon on the Salmon river. During the past week 50,000 Chinook salmon eggs have been shipped to the Maine state Fish Commission. Mr. Wallich says that this phenomenal catch is apportioned among the several hatcheries as follows: Tanner Creek, 80,000; Eagle Creek, 1,134,000; Little White Salmon, 17,251,000; Big White Salmon, 10,000,000; making a total for the Columbia river of 28,465,000; Clackamas river, 10,180,000; Rogue river, 8,845,000, making a grand total of 47,490,000 for the season.
