Senator Mitchell has introduced in the United States senate the bill for an appropriation of \$1,250,000 for the Lewis and Clark Centennial Exposition, to be held in Portland in 1905. The author of the bill will try to secure for the measure an early consideration and its early passage.

Two large trees were blown down near Highland Monday. In falling, the trees fell across the sawmill plant of Milo Polich's, crushing the roof beneath. Several of the workmen, who were employed in the building, had a narrow escape from serious injury. The trees that caused the damage had rotted and were unable to withstand the wind.
