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Barton.

This place is having quite a boom since the railroad was built through it. The railroad company has put up a neat station and a freight house, and has put in two side tracks; and, with the building of a bridge across the Clackamas river, giving the people of Logan a means of getting their produce to the railroad, this place promises to become a leading trading and shipping center. The freight house referred to was erected and is still owned by Mr. Burghardt, instead of the railroad company.

While Barton is in the midst of a farming community, there are fine bodies of timber for lumber and cord wood. Gurringer's sawmill is filling the local demand for lumber, besides shipping a considerable quantity of it away. Two years ago, in passing through this place, one was struck with the graveyard quietness of everything, save the low muzzling of Mr. Burghardt's grist mill; or, the occasional hoot of a grouse in the top of some lofty fir; or perhaps, the drowsy tinkle of a cow bell or the roar of Deep creek as it wended its way to the noisy Clackamas; but now, how different! The public road is alive with travel, the wheels ring with the sound of sledge and wedge, and with the echo of steam whistles as the locomotives take out the car-loads of cord-wood. With the railroad and cheap freight rates Barton is practically as near the city markets as Lents or Clackamas. Freight can be shipped as cheaply from this point as it can be hauled from the two places mentioned.

Among the contemplated improvements may be mentioned a bridge across the Clackamas river, giving the people of Logan an outlet to the railroad. It is understood that the railroad company will pay for two-thirds of the cost of the bridge; the building of a large general store at the railroad station; and a new schoolhouse, badly needed, if present indications are trustworthy.

Barton is 11 miles from Oregon City and 22 from Portland, on the O. W. P. & Ry. Co. R. R.
