AN ORDINANCE NO.

To license, tax and regulate transient dealers.

OREGON CITY DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That any person, company or corporation who shall as a temporary or transient dealer offer for sale or sell at retail any goods, wares and merchandise or musical instruments in the City of Oregon City shall pay a daily license of Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars per day, which said license shall be paid to the City Treasurer in advance before any such property is sold or offered for sale.

Section 2. Any person, company, company or corporation who brings a stock of goods, wares and merchandise or musical instruments into the City of Oregon City, and who shall sell or offer the same for sale at retail in said City, without making the same a continuous and permanent stock and without establishing a continuous and permanent business, or who shall advertise that he is bringing into the City a bankrupt stock shall be deemed a transient and temporary dealer under this ordinance.

Section 3. Any person violating the terms or provisions of this ordinance, upon conviction thereof before the City Recorder shall pay a fine of not less than One Hundred Dollars, nor more than Two Hundred Dollars; and in the default of the payment of such fine and costs of action shall be confined in the City Jail one day for each Two Dollars of such fine and costs.
