They are issued to show the conditions that have prevailed during the month in question, for the above period of years, but must not be construed as a forecast of the weather conditions for the coming month.

**Month of May for 32 years.**  
TEMPERATURE.  
Mean or normal temperature, 52 deg. The warmest month was that of 1888, with an average of 62 deg.

**PRECIPITATION (Rain and melted snow.)**  
Average for the month, 2.39 inches. Average number of days with .01 of an inch or more, 13.

**CLOUDS AND WEATHER.**  
Average number of clear days, 7; partly cloudy days, 11; cloudy days, 13.
