EFFICIENT COUNTY OFFICERS WHO WILL BE RE-ELECTED.

A Quartet Whose Record Commends Its Members for Another Term—Who They Are.

The Enterprise takes pleasure this week in presenting the likenesses of four of the present county officers who are candidates for a second term and will be re-elected. In addition to possessing every necessary qualification these four officers—Clerk Slemons, Assessor Nelson, Superintendent Zittel and Recorder Stevens—to be still further commended for their faithful performing a public duty. The work of these four officers deserves no comment. In every instance it has been thorough and faultless.

FOR CLERK.

F. A. Sleight, Republican nominee for county clerk, was born and reared near Rockford, Ill. He removed with his family to Oregon in 1885, and to Oregon City in 1890. He was one of the incorporators and stockholders of the Oregon City Canning Co., and was bookkeeper and assistant-superintendent during its existence. He afterwards served five years with E. E. Williams in the capacity of head clerk and bookkeeper. In 1900 Mr. Sleight was appointed by the government census examiner for Canby, New Era, Canemah and Maple Lane precincts. He owns a fruit farm near Canby, which he has operated successfully for a number of years. Mr. Sleight received his education at the Rockford High School, was raised in habits of industry and economy. Mr. Sleight is possessed of more than average clerical ability and the records of that department are a credit to his administration. During his first term Mr. Sleight has demonstrated his ability to properly handle the affairs in this department, and is entirely deserving of the second term to which he will be elected in June.

FOR RECORDER.

Henry E. Stevens, who is a candidate for a second term as county recorder, is a native of Clackamas county, having been born at Canemah November 16, 1865. He was raised at Canemah, attending the public schools, and afterwards was graduated from the Portland Business College. Ten years ago he removed to Milwaukie, and for five years before his election in June, 1902, was employed by the Oregon Water Power & Railway Company on the line between Portland and Oregon City. He served as deputy under Recorder Whitlock, and that his training was thorough is perhaps best in evidence

had an officer who has done the work thoroughly and without discrimination. Mr. Nelson is 54 years of age, having been born at Springfield, Ill., in 1850. Before he was 16 years of age he enlisted in the Third Wisconsin cavalry, which operated in Kansas amongst noted Confederate leaders. He remained in the army until the close of the war. Mr. Nelson came to Oregon and for five years was employed as clerk and bookkeeper in a general merchandise store. Removing to Clackamas county in 1877, he engaged in farming at Liberal. During the term of R. M. Ramsey as recorder, Mr. Nelson was employed as a deputy for a time and also served as a deputy under Assessors Bradley and Williams. To Mr. Nelson belongs the credit of having last year assessed the property of Clackamas county at a figure more nearly the actual valuation than did

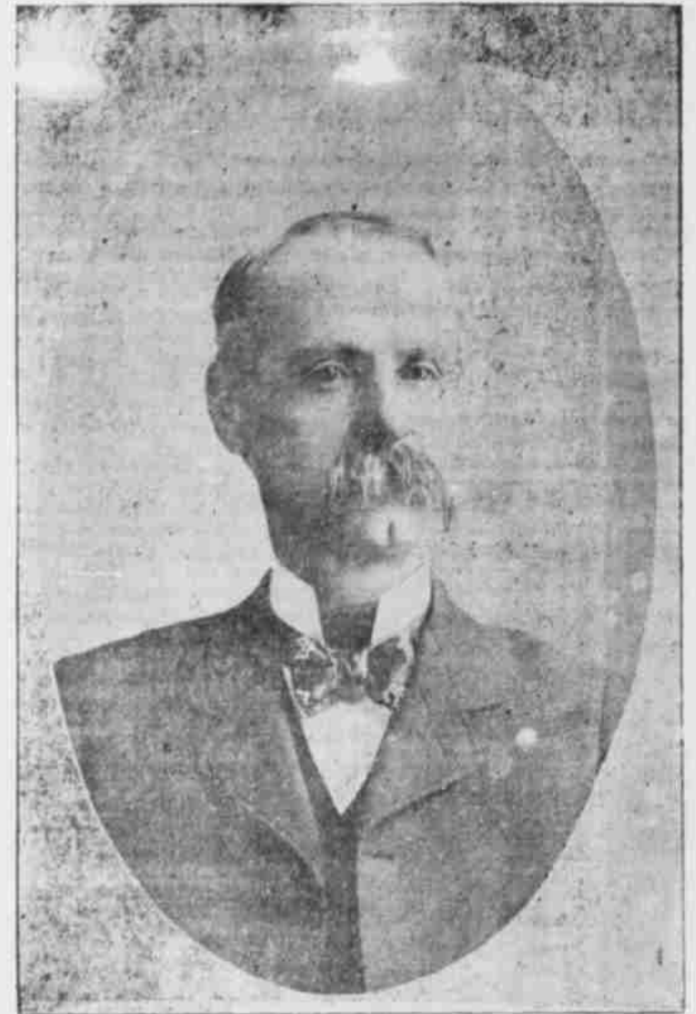
INTEREST OF LABOR

STATE FEDERATION HOLDS ANNUAL CONVENTION.

Over One Hundred Delegates Were in Attendance—Some Important Resolutions.

The second annual convention of the State Federation of Labor was convened at the Woodmen Hall in this city at 10 o'clock Monday morning. One hundred delegates were in attendance on opening day, but the number was increased by another

hundred before the convention concluded its sessions Wednesday evening.

Sol S. Walker, of the Oregon City Painters' Union, called the convention to order and introduced Mayor Grant B. Dimick, who extended to the delegates the freedom of the city. C. W. Gram of Portland, president of the State Federation, assumed the chairmanship of the meeting, and after reviewing the progress of labor in this state, announced a committee on credentials as follows: H. B. Parsons, Portland; Sol Walker, Oregon City; S. B. Hattie, LaGrande; L. W. Bennett, Portland; and G. E. Cox, Salem. While the committee on credentials was preparing its report, several addresses were made by prominent labor people and organizers, among those in attendance being State Labor Commissioner Hoff, of Salem.

"A vital stage in the history of organized labor has been reached," stated D. C. Conway, of Chicago, first vice-president and national organizer for the Retail Clerks' Protective Association, "because of the opposition that is being waged against trades unionism from all sources by the common enemy." He advocated a closer alliance among the labor organizations under the direction of an intelligent management to cope with the situation. He spoke of the remarkable growth of the organization of the clerks, which had increased in a few years from 53 locals to 1003 locals, representing a greater growth than any other separate labor organization. Mr. Conway argued that the interests of union labor can be largely served in the employment of union clerks whose efforts are employed in promoting the sale of union-made goods to the disparagement of non-union made goods and the products of penal institutions.

S. Rosenberg, of San Francisco, who recently visited China and Japan as a representative of the American Federation of Labor, and investigated labor conditions there, told of his trip and investigations.
