The Catholic Sunday school and church gave a very enjoyable social at Woodmen Hall Tuesday evening. One of the interesting numbers on the program was the clever whistling of Prof. Draper to piano accompaniment. Dancing followed the program.

Frank Brown, who has charge of the state fish hatchery at Ontario, Multnomah county, visited with relatives here this week. Frank is getting stout and "sassy," salmon culture evidently agreeing with him. The hatchery at Ontario is the largest in the world.

Addison Kidd last Saturday committed a murderous assault on James Warren, a fellow life-time prisoner, at the Oregon state penitentiary. Kidd struck Warren over the head with an axe, fracturing the skull of the latter, who is still alive. Kidd is believed to be demented.

S. R. Greene returned this week from the Crown Boys' mine in Lane county. He reports that the weather is such at the present time that the working of the mine cannot be continued with good success. Mr. Greene will return to the mine as soon as the weather becomes settled.

The Japanese are meeting with surprising success on land. In a recent engagement at the Yalu river, the Russians report a loss of between 3000 and 4000 men. Monday night the Japs landed troops and attacked and captured Niu Chwang, the Russians falling back to protect the railway.

The Oregon City baseball team last Sunday defeated the West Side nine at Willamette Falls, the score being 11 to 5. This was a practice game, but it aroused considerable interest in that it was a try out of those who are trying for places on the team. P. G. Shark, who is managing the nine, will determine the make-up of the team and place the players within a few days.

Because an affidavit had the words "plain view," instead of "public places," and contrary to the code governing the posting of notices when it is intended to open up a new county road, Judge McBride reversed the decision of the County Court in the matter of the Davis road. This case has been in the courts for the past two years and is pretty well known to every one in the county.

Dr. J. W. Powell, of this city, who was recently nominated for coroner on the Democratic ticket, without being consulted, has declined the nomination, creating another vacancy on the minority ticket.

Vera Jane Edwards, assisted by local talent, will give a dramatic reading at First Baptist Church Friday evening, May 13. Miss Edwards recently gave a reading at Portland that was very flatteringly commented on.

Margaret F. Thornton, who was married to Luke Thornton in this city in July, 1901, commenced divorce proceedings in the Clackamas County Circuit Court, alleging cruel and inhuman treatment and personal indignities. She asks for a divorce, the custody of four minor children by a former marriage, and \$25 a month alimony.

A tunnel is being constructed at the Ogles Creek mining property by Fairclough Bros. et al. the locators. Workmen are cross-cutting the lead at a depth of 200 feet. A double shift will be employed soon, and it is expected the new tunnel will be completed within sixty days. When this tunnel has been finished the true value of these mining properties will be disclosed and the development of the mine proceeded with.

At the meeting of the council Wednesday evening, the D. W. P. Ry. Co. was given one week in which to pay \$1750 delinquent license, covering a period of two years, otherwise the city threatens to revoke the franchises under which this corporation is running its system. An ordinance was also passed fixing at \$50 per day the license fee that should be charged all "transient merchants" visiting this city with bankrupt stocks of goods.

About forty convicts at the Oregon state penitentiary went on a strike last Saturday morning, and refused to go to their work in the laundry on account of the food they were receiving, claiming that they were not being fed sufficiently well. The enforcement of prison discipline, backed up by an armed guard, took the notion out of the heads of the obstreperous convicts, who returned to their work without further controversy.

Senator Brownell and Lily Stipp were in Portland this week conducting a damage suit in Multnomah county. In October, 1902, W. L. DeBoise, an employee of the Eastern & Western Lumber Company, suffered a broken leg while employed in the company's mill. He employed Brownell and Stipp to bring an action for damage against the company, and the jury returned a verdict for \$2500 in favor of the plaintiff. Rufus Mallory and John M. Gearin, two prominent Portland attorneys, appeared for the defendant corporation.

Ed Reckner, manager of the Web-foot Athletic Club, of this city, has watched Young Yousuff, the Terrible Turk, and Chas. Smith, The Stranger, of Yuma, Arizona, in a wrestling match at the Armory in this city Wednesday evening, May 11, for a \$50 side bet and gate receipts. Yousuff agrees to throw Smith three times in an hour. Mysterious Billy Smith, of Portland, will probably be the referee. This will be the first real interesting wrestling exhibition for Oregon City in years, and lovers of the sport will probably turn out in large numbers.

PREPARE FOR THE CAMPAIGN.

Canvass of County Begins May 17 - Places of Speaking.

At a meeting here Tuesday of the members of the Republican County Central Committee and the nominees on the Republican county and legislative ticket, it was decided to make an active canvass of the entire county, beginning May 17. Arrangements were also made for encouraging the registration of voters throughout the county. To date there have registered but 3023 out of a voting strength of 5000. With the disorganized condition of the Democrats of the county, the re-election of the entire Republican county and legislative ticket is assured by good majorities.

At the meeting Tuesday, C. Scheibel, of Oregon City, was elected secretary of the County Central Committee. It was decided at what points speaking will be had during the canvass of the county. Dates for the different meetings were not fixed, but will be announced subsequently by posters. The candidates, in the three weeks preceding election, will speak at the following places:
