### AIDING THE ENEMY

#### HOW SECRETARY HITCHCOCK SEEKS TO DEFEAT MR. HERMANN.

Special Agent Greene, Federal Officer, Attends Democratic Meetings and Attempts to Prove Charges.

Excitement, not usually witnessed at a Democratic rally in Clackamas county, prevailed at the meeting of the untried, at the Army hall in this city Monday evening when Col. R. M. Veatch, candidate for congressman and the candidates on the county and legislative tickets, addressed an audience of about eighty voters.

In the course of his remarks, which were devoted entirely to an attack on Congressman Hermann, Mr. Veatch alleged there had been many irregular practices in connection with the public lands of the state of Oregon, and charged among other things that it was on the report of a special agent of the government that a former surveyor general of the state, together with his chief deputy, had been dismissed from office because of crooked work.

When Veatch had concluded his address, Henry Meldrum, the former surveyor general of the state, arose and, addressing the chair, stated that Mr. A. B. Greene, a special agent for the government, was in the audience. "I charge this man Greene," said Meldrum, "with being the special agent who has furnished the Democratic candidate for congress with the information that is being used in this campaign. Get up," shouted Meldrum to Greene, "and substantiate these charges as made by Veatch."

But the representative of the government made no response. Meldrum insisted that Greene should either repudiate or confirm the charges that had been made by Veatch, but the agent did not make a reply until asked directly what was the fact in the case.

"The charges are practically and substantially correct," replied Greene, taking the floor.

"They are positively false," retorted Meldrum, "and you are an intolerable liar, scoundrel and coward."

Continuing, Special Agent Greene ignored Meldrum, and stated that some of the newspaper reports on which Mr. Veatch bases some of his charges with reference to irregular practices in the public land business were faulty and incorrect. He admitted that it was from his report that the administration had sought to make changes in the office of the former surveyor general of the state, and that there was in the possession of the government authorities additional evidence that will result in the filing of other indictments at a subsequent time. To indicate who these persons might be or might not be, said Greene, was inadvisable, for the reason that such a disclosure would defeat the ends of justice.

Mr. Greene explained that he came to the city purely on a business mission and was an accidental visitor to the meeting; that he certainly did not come to arouse any strife or controversy.

When Greene had resumed his seat Meldrum said: "The gentleman's statements are all wrong. When Secretary Hitchcock finds it necessary to send a special agent to Oregon in order to aid in the election of a Democratic congressman, he will find that the First district will give Mr. Hermann, the regular Republican nominee, the largest vote in the history of the district."

This concluded the somewhat stormy scene, which was followed by speaking by several of the legislative and county candidates, and by the way, the speech-making by the various candidates was decidedly tame and in striking contrast with their efforts at Molalla, where the Republicans were charged with everything under the sun. Even Chairman Eby made no reference to the figures pertaining to county affairs with which he was so plentifully supplied at the Molalla meeting. Not a single speaker attempted to disprove any of the contentions of the Enterprise that the county is being conducted under the present Republican officers more economically and with better results than in years. Is it possible they have discovered that our figures are positively correct? In fact an intelligent investigation of the records will produce results fully substantiating every claim that has been made in behalf of the present officers through the columns of the Enterprise.

### TO ELECT THE TICKET

#### REPUBLICANS MUCH ENCOURAGED BY THEIR CANVASS.

Voters are Generally Satisfied and Do Not Want Uncertainty of a Democratic Administration.

An Oregon City special to the Oregonian says: With the close of the first week of the canvass of Clackamas county by the opposing political parties, the prospect of the election of the entire Republican county and legislative tickets is more pronounced, while the candidates on the Republican state ticket will receive increased majorities. The finances of Clackamas county are in better shape than they have been in years, and with a continuation of the present conservative policy in county affairs, the county's obligations can be entirely discharged before the time of another election. A tour of the county reveals that voters generally are satisfied with present conditions and will be slow to displace the present Republican officers, who are candidates for re-election and substitute therefor Democratic nominees and the uncertainty of the administration that follows such action. As a claim for retention in their respective chairs for another term, the Republicans are showing that in the last two years the county has been conducted more economically than in years, while the county indebtedness has been reduced from \$149,000 to \$51,000. The Democrats, who are making a special fight against Superintendent of Schools Zinser and Sheriff Shaver, have adopted a programme of misrepresentation, insinuation, an exaggerated contention as to the high taxes and the county's indebtedness and are making an appeal to the independent voter.

### Canby Captured the Game.

It was a batting game that was played on the West side Friday, but the lads from Canby batted one too many times for the pucky lads from the Eastham school, who lost the game by the narrow score of 15 to 14. The visiting players were much the larger, and it is only a wonder that the score was not more uneven. The Eastham boys have begun to get proud of their record this season. ### IN THE ENEMY'S TERRITORY.

Republican Candidates Are Cordially Received at Molalla.

Tuesday evening the Republican candidates invaded Molalla, the Democratic stronghold of the county. A large audience, about equally divided as to political convictions, gave the various speakers a respectful and attentive hearing. County politics alone were discussed and the exaggerated statements and allegations made a week ago by the Democratic nominees were pretty thoroughly dissected and shown up as the distorted facts, hatched for political purposes, that they are.

County Judge T. F. Ryan and Mayor Grant B. Dimick gave some facts with reference to county affairs that the Democrats have been very careful to conceal. As an evidence of their sincerity in the matter, also, a number of the speakers offered to back up the genuineness of their claims by making deposits of sums ranging from \$500 to \$500 the same to be forfeited if the respective claims are disproven.

Judge Ryan gave an effective talk along the line of county politics and gave some convincing statistics concerning the true condition of the county. In the course of his remarks, Judge Ryan said that he would deposit in any bank the sum of \$500 and would forfeit the same if by an examination of the records it could be shown that the total net indebtedness of the county is within \$100,000 of the "more than \$200,000" claimed by the Democrats.

Mayor Dimick explained the cause of high taxes and Sheriff Shaver made an offer of \$200 to be given any person who will show that the office of sheriff during the first year of his term cost the taxpayers of Clackamas county within \$50 of what the same office cost during the last term of Sheriff Cooke.

Others of the county and legislative candidates also spoke, making a good impression. The meeting, which was one of the most successful ones of the canvass, did not adjourn until after 11 o'clock.

On the same evening Chris Schuebel and J. F. Clark addressed an audience of 100 persons at Needy.

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Republicans are especially active and when Beaman carried the county by more than 200 majority. Recognizing the worth of Congressman Hermann to the district, the full party majority will be recorded for the gentleman from Douglas. J. E. Hodges, of this city, Democratic candidate for joint representative from Clackamas and Multnomah counties, is conducting an active campaign against his opponent, Hon. G. W. Holcomb, Jr., of Portland, whom he charges with being a renegade Democrat. Hodges' popularity will gain for him a good vote in Clackamas county.

Between 4500 and 5000 votes is considered a conservative estimate of the number of ballots that will be cast at the June election in Clackamas county. The total registration for this county this year was 4204, instead of 2556, as reported this morning. Last year's registration amounted to only 4317. In June, 1902, 4560 votes were cast for governor in this county, but the voting strength of the county has been greatly increased in the last two years by the rapid and extensive settlement of the eastern section of the county.
