DENOUNCED HIS DEFAMERS.

Congressman Hermann Makes Convincing Address to Large Audience.

Before an audience that packed Rhiney's opera house in this city Congressman Hermann vindicated himself of the charges that have been preferred against him by Col. Veach, his Democratic opponent and others of his defamers. The address of Mr. Hermann was attentively listened to and made a good impression. The argument of the speaker was convincing and the denunciatory statements carried conviction with them.

After briefly discussing local affairs, in which was mentioned the improvement of the Willamette river, which is of importance to local prosperity, and the probability of the Oregon delegation securing for Oregon City a public building, Congressman Hermann reverted to the charges that are being made against him by the Portland Journal as a lying, unscrupulous, scurrilous and defamatory publication and defied his maligners, whom he termed liars, defamers and villainous scoundrels.

Taking in turn each of the charges that have been preferred against him, Mr. Hermann showed the utter fallacy of each and every one of the accusations, which are based on the misconstruction of statutes and deliberate misstatement

of actual facts as they exist and are corroborated by records.

Mr. Hermann convincingly explained by quoting statutes that his filing on the land at the Roseburg land office was entirely regular and said this act was not questioned until about 18 months ago. He showed that his filings were regularly confirmed by the commissioner of the general land office, and that the construction of the law with reference thereto was not even modified until 15 years later.

Equally satisfactory disposition was made of other charges and in refuting the claim that he is appropriating to himself money saved from clerk hire Mr. Hermann denounced the charge as utterly false and stated that on the contrary he is employing three clerks and expending for clerical aid more than the government allows him.

Mr. Hermann stated that patents alleged by his enemies to have been issued in 13 days were actually in the general land office from June to November, as shown by the records. Having thoroughly vindicated himself of the charges, Mr. Hermann invited the auditors to ask any questions, but there were none made. In concluding, Mr. Hermann discussed national politics, revealing the soundness and prosperity of the country under the administration of Republican policies. The mention of McKinley and Roosevelt found a responsive chord in the audience, which gave enthusiastic applause.

Senator Brownell presided as chairman of the meeting, and before introducing Mr. Hermann spoke briefly in commendation of the Republican county and legislative tickets.

Before the meeting was called to order, the Oregon City band made its initial appearance for the season and played a number of selections on the streets. In its faithful practice during the winter months this organization has made considerable improvement, and the people of Oregon City will be glad to hear more of this band during the summer months. At the opera house, the Maccabees quartette was heard in several numbers, receiving encores each time. In presenting the quartette, Senator Brownell referred to the singers as the quartette "that sang the Republican ticket to victory a year ago." A very cordial reception was extended the singers, who sustained their reputation of being the best quartette that was ever heard in Oregon City.

Roosevelt Club Organized.

At the close of the Hermann rally, a Roosevelt Republican club was organized with 150 charter members. Captain M. D. Phillips was elected president and W. A. Dimick secretary. The president and G. H. Dimick, Wm. Sheehan, J. W. Moffett and George Caffrey were constituted a committee to nominate ten vice presidents and the other officers of the organization. The purpose for which the club has been formed is to aid in every possible way the Republican county central committee in both the June and November elections.

READ THE BILL CAREFULLY.

Proposed Local Option Measure Means Practical Prohibition.

Before voting for or against either of the measures proposed by the initiative petition for endorsement by the people at the June election, the voter should carefully read and interpret the two bills, and gain an unimpaired true of the local option measure. Copies of this bill are to be had for the asking at the office of the county clerk.

As a matter of fact, the enactment of this apparently fair measure into a law by the people will prove simply a step preliminary to positive prohibition in the state of Oregon. The question arises, do the people of the state want prohibition?

Under the statutes as they now exist a saloon cannot be established in any precinct of the county save by petition or more than a majority of the voters of that precinct. When established, these resorts are regulated and controlled by county court or city council, while the business of these places and the manner in which it shall be carried on is regulated by law. Therefore, the people of the state practically have local option now.

Appended are a few opinions from prominent men of the country touching on the subject of local option and prohibition:

Bishop Stanley, of North Dakota—"I am convinced that prohibition is doing incalculable harm to the state and to many of its inhabitants. In many trips around the state I see and hear these facts. Such being the

case, I contend that the time has come to make a change for the better. While refraining from approving or disapproving prohibition as a theory, I say that prohibition as a fact is a flat failure in North Dakota.

Ex-Secretary Russell A. Alger, Michigan—"You can't talk prohibition in Michigan, for we have tried it and know what a dire failure it is. When we had prohibition the state was flooded with smuggled beer and whiskey, and it was impossible for us to prevent it. We now license saloons, and while there is no more liquor drunk than there was during the reign of prohibition, we derive an enormous revenue from the traffic, besides preventing liquors from being smuggled into the state and sold illegally, as it puts the saloon men to guarding each other. I have always considered prohibition a failure, and don't believe it can ever be made effectual."

C. S. Judge D. E. Bryant, Texas—"Theory is one thing, but actual observance and experience are better. When prohibition was submitted to a vote of the people of Texas, I voted for it in good faith. Since June 2, 1897, I have faithfully endeavored to enforce prohibition laws of the United States prevailing in the Indian Territory in my jurisdiction. I have had the assistance of a competent and faithful district attorneys and marshals, excellent grand and petit juries, in fact, everything that could be desired to make the law effective, if it could be made so. My experience has taught me that it is folly to believe for a moment that it can be successfully prohibited. It leads to all manner of evasions, even to perjury and subordination of perjury. It builds up feuds locally, which frequently result in personal conflicts, and in some instances murder is the result. Notwithstanding the rigid prosecution the traffic is unabated; in fact, if any difference, increases.

"Wherever local option exists you will find lawless persons who will sell to any and everybody wherever they can, not respecting minority or other conditions. The courts will be flooded with prosecutions, and there will be but few convictions, and the expense will be very large."
