SCARCITY OF INSTRUCTORS. Teachers Decline Employment at Prevailing Wages.

With the opening of the school year generally set for Monlay, or, at the latest, the week following, boards of directors of twenty of the 119 school dis tricts in Clackamas county, have been anable to secure instructors at the prevailing salaries that are being paid in this county, reported the Oregonian correspondent last Monday. This condition does not disclose any great scarcity of instructors, although teachers are not as plentiful now as in previous years but is conclusive evidence of the unsatisfactory wages that are being paid teachers. The average wages paid female inatructors in the Clackamas county schools, as shown in the recent annual report of Superintendent Zinser, is \$36.88 while male teachers are receiving an average salary of only \$44. Present indications are that the traffic opening of the schools in a number of the rural districts will have to be postponed until the search for teachers can be further prosecuted by the interested school boards.

DEFECT IN THE DISTRICT PRIMARY LAW EASY OF REMEDY.

W. S. U'Ren Explains That Defective Provision, But Temporarity Interferes With Law's Operation.

In the opinion of W. S. U Ren, the original framer of the direct primary commuting law, who has returned from Eastern Oregon, the defect that has been discovered in that measure is triffing and does not seriously interfere with the legality of the law.

In amending the registration law a as to admit of the re-opening of the registration books prior to the Presiden tial election for the registration of registered electors, the framers of the bill falled to make provision for the supplemental registration of voters who had strendy regostered, enabling them to in dicate their party affiliation. an admitted oversight, resulting som a most careful and exhaustive consideration of the more important details the bill.

The drafters of the direct primary nominating law have for several weeks been aware of the defect in the law as it applies to all municipal elections that may be held before the next bi-ennial registration is had. At a conference of Mr. U'Ren, Judge McBride, Mr. Greene and President A. L. Mills, of the Direct Primary Nominating League, held some weeks ago, the ommission of the necessary provision was discussed, but it was ascertained that only the towns of Oregon City, Salem and Baker City would hold municipal elections before the state legislature would meet, when the defect could be remedied. Under a liberal construction of the measure it was the opinion of the framers of the bill that lectors could have the right when the registration books were opened this month to supplement their original regis-tration by declaring their politics, but the proportion of the people of the state who will be effected before an opportunity is presented for its correction is so small that it was considered inexpedient to rules a question of law as that course.

Mr. U'Ben and other friends of the bill sincerely regret the omission, since if the measure could be applied in the municipal elections this Fall some idea could be formed as to the success with which it operated and with what spirit of interest it was received by the people In that way any defects, if any there are, could be discovered and remedied at the legislative session at Salem next Winter before elections in other larger cities and for county and state officers are held.

No endeavor will be made to apply the direct nominating law in the management of city elections at Oregon City. Salem or Baker City. These places have been running independent tickets of late years and since the law contemplates strict party organizations, the only consequence is that the experiment must be deferred. Municipal tickets in these towns will be placed in the field this year by the primaries or tions, as heretofore.

The friends of the bill, which has been thoroughly investigated since its adoption by the people last June, do not think that another defect is to be found within its provisions. Simple and sufficient is the remedy proposed, and because of the enormous vote the bill received at the polls in June, Mr. U'Ren thinks the legislature will not hesitate to speedily make the desired amendment to the measure.
