FLAW NOT SERIOUS

DEFECT IN THE DISTRICT PRIMARY LAW EASY OF REMEDY.

W. S. U'Ren Explains That Defective Provision, But Temporarily Interferes With Law's Operation.

In the opinion of W. S. U'Ren, the original framer of the direct primary nominating law, who has returned from Eastern Oregon, the defect that has been discovered in that measure is trifling and does not seriously interfere with the legality of the law.

In amending the registration law so as to admit of the re-opening of the registration books prior to the Presidential election for the registration of unregistered voters, the framers of the bill failed to make provision for the supplemental registration of voters who had already registered, enabling them to indicate their party affiliation.

The drafters of the direct primary nominating law have for several weeks been aware of the defect in the law as it applies to all municipal elections that may be held before the next biennial registration is had.

Mr. U'Ren and other friends of the bill sincerely regret the omission, since if the measure could be applied in the municipal elections this Fall some idea could be formed as to the success with which it operated and with what spirit of interest it was received by the people.

No endeavor will be made to apply the direct nominating law in the management of city elections at Oregon City, Salem or Baker City.

The friends of the bill, which has been thoroughly investigated since its adoption by the people last June, do not think that another defect is to be found within its provisions.

SCARCITY OF INSTRUCTORS.

Teachers Decline Employment at Prevailing Wages.

With the opening of the school year generally set for Monday, or at the latest, the week following, boards of directors of twenty of the 119 school districts in Clackamas county, have been unable to secure instructors at the prevailing salaries that are being paid in this county.

The larger districts of the county, which are able to pay from \$50 to \$75 per month, are eagerly sought after and the places are taken early in the season, but no end of trouble is experienced in securing instructors for the smaller schools of more limited means.
