WILL MEET MONDAY

CONSIDERATION RAILROAD FRANCHISE AGAIN DEFERRED.

Some Would Have Passed Measure Wednesday Night—Koerner and Knapp Have Ideas.

Action was not taken on the Southern Pacific Franchise ordinance by the members of the city council at the regular meeting of that body Wednesday evening. But this was not the fault of the two representatives of the railroad company or the majority members of the council. The postponement of the further consideration of the ordinance until next Monday evening is due largely to the positive refusal of Councilman Koerner to consent to the consideration and passage of the ordinance at the meeting Wednesday evening. The presence of several members of the citizen's committee may have cut some figure also in bringing about a postponement of the ordinance.

While it did not come to the surface, there was a movement on foot to have the ordinance passed at the meeting Wednesday night. Attorney Leiter and Mr. O'Brien, representing the Southern Pacific Company, attended the meeting. They submitted plans and specifications for the work that is proposed to be done by the corporation in exchange for the franchise. The plans and specifications conform strictly to the terms and conditions of the improvements as outlined in the ordinance as published recently and to which strong remonstrance was made at a public meeting of the citizens. In other words, the conditions of the contract proposed by the railroad company do not recognize the slightest alteration in the provisions of the franchise ordinance as it was revised the first time.

A special meeting of the council will be held next Monday evening, October 10, and at that time the ordinance will be taken up and finally decided upon as to terms and provisions under which the franchise is to be granted. Judging from the attitude of the council on the subject, there is every indication that there will be something for the citizens' committee to do before the franchise is finally disposed of.

Business Routine.

There was transacted a considerable amount of routine business. Mrs. Sarah I. Randolph's petition for the opening up of Eighth street, between blocks 48 and 49, was referred to the committee on streets and public property to be reported back to the council at its next regular meeting.

An ordinance was introduced directing the purchase by the city of a strip of land three feet wide from off lots 2 and 7 in block 49, owned by Mrs. Fannie Cochran, the consideration to be \$150. This adjustment will terminate a protracted controversy between the city and Mrs. Cochran.

An arch light was ordered established

at the scales on the Molalla road at Ellyville and another at 11th and Jackson streets.

E. Zimmerman, a German property owner on the hill, having a way about him that was as emphatic as it was convincing, called the attention of the council to the need of providing some drainage for the street at the intersection of Sixth and John Adams street. The matter was referred to the committee on Streets and Public Property.

Bids for the improvement of Third St. from Main street to Railroad Avenue were opened as follows: Jones & McKay \$1564; Batdorf Bros. \$1311.25; E. D. Olds \$1392.70. The bids were taken under consideration.

Koerner Versus Hoboes.

Councilman Koerner inquired if the practice of running in hoboes and boarding them at the city expense was not being carried on to a greater extent than was warranted. He objected to a man being hauled out of a box car into which he had crawled for a night's sleep and then arraigned in the city police court on the charge of vagrancy. It was explained to Mr. Koerner that the arrest of these individuals was provided for by a city ordinance and that the proper way to terminate the practice was to amend the ordinance.

Advocates Municipal Ownership.

Councilman Knapp later in the evening sprang another surprise on the members of the council. When the subject of providing two electric arc lights was being discussed, Mr. Knapp announced that he thought the time had arrived when the city should take some steps to provide its own light—purchase the necessary machinery and install its own light plant. He reasoned that the city would find such an investment a paying one. The speaker then declared that the city of Oregon City is paying at the rate of \$7.25 per arc light while the people of Milwaukee get the same service for \$5 per lamp. He failed to see why such discrimination should prevail. "It is now three years under the present contract with the electric light company expires," continued Mr. Knapp, "and we should take this matter up at once and either secure better rates for lighting the city or else install a plant of our own."
