JACQUES GETS PETITION.

Oswego Saloon Man Defeats Strong Opposition.

Strong opposition was offered by the temperance people of Oswego precinct to the application of Henry Jacques for the granting by the County Court of a license to sell fiquor at Oswego.

Mr. Jacques' petition was signed by 111 legal voters and when it was considered at the session of the court last week, a large delegation of the citizens of Oswego were in attendance to remonstrate. In the same connection the court ruled that 24 of the non-signers were not legal voters of Oswego precinct. This left a bona fide population of legal voters numbering 218.

The court investigated the voting qualifications of the signers to the petition and determined that the petition had the names of three more than a majority of the legal voters having a residence in the precinct. On this showing, the liense was granted.

The petitioner, Jacques, until two nonths ago, conducted a saloon at Oswego. . At that time he filed a petition for a renewal of his license which was denied because a remonstrance having a greater number of signatures was presented. The application was vigorously fought by Mr. Jacques on one side and the temperance people on the other, each side having employed attorneys.

WILL CAMPAIGN FOR ROOSEVELT.

Clackamas County Orators Will Participate in Canvass of State.

The Presidential campaign in Oregon by the Republicans will occupy only about two weeks. It will begin about October 20th and will be very generally carried on throughout the state until the day of election. The result of the efforts of the large number of public speakers who have tendered their services to the State Committee will be found in a majority approximating 20,60 in Oregon for Roosevelt and Fairbanks at the November

Clackamas county is again this year contributing its share of campaign orators. Among those who have notified Chairman Baker of a willingness to participate in the campaign are: Senator. Brownell, Mayor Grant B. Dimick, who is one of the Presidential Electors; C. H. Dye, J. U. Campbell and Gordon E. Hayes.

It is not definitely known what speaking will be arranged for Clackamas county, but the county will be thoroughly covered by competent and entertaining speakers in exposition of Republican principles and policies,

THE MANEUVERS AT AMERICAN LAKE.

The recent "war games," in which the troops of Oregon, Washington and Idaho participated, is the subject of an instructive and entertaining arti-cle by General Thomas H. Anderson, A., (retired), in the October Pacific Monthly. In discussing the value of these maneuvers, he says: "In civil life no one believes that business methods or mechanical excellence can be learned or acquired from books. Practice must supplement theory. This is just as true of the art military. Manuals of tactics state the space a brigade of a given strength should occupy in close or open ground, and the time required for a deployment of change of front. A man of average intelligence can commit these statements to memory in a very short time, yet no one without practice can estimate the distances involved in the simplest field maneuver. Distances look so surprisingly different under differing conditions; whether, for instance, we es timate over land or water, over hills or plains, or by night or day, or in sunshine or fog. In estimating dis-tances, the fire of an enemy is, of course, a very confusing factor. In calculating the time it may take to reach a given position, the condition of the roads or character of the intervening country will have to be considered, and an absolute assurance can only be obtained by reconnoiter-What the enemy may do in the way of obstruction or opposition fur-ther complicates the problem. The object of field maneuvers is to make the problems given as nearly like those of actual warfaxe as possible.

A petition has been circulated among the patrons of the R. F. D. routes No. 1 and 2 asking for a change in the course. The routes are both too long. and it is to remedy this and to establish R. F. D. No. 4 that this action is taken. Route No. 1 will then be evtended to Liberal and No. 2 will cover the territory between No. 1 and 2, extending into the Molalla country.-Aurora Boreallis,

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
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
