SPENT MUCH MONEY ON ROADS.

During the Year Clackamas Paid Out \$10,000 on This Account.

"During the last year Clackamas county has expended \$10,000 in road building," said Judge Ryan today. "The policy of the county court is to build permanently when any piece of road is constructed and where the funds are available," continued Mr. Ryan. "This year Clackamas county has been especially fortunate in its road building, having the funds on hand with which to meet every warrant that has been issued on this account. In our road building, the court has been disposed to very generally follow the plan of reducing the grade of all roads that are treated, finding that this course contributes much to the permanency of the improvements that are made."

The announcement that Clackamas county roads will next year be experimented with in the use of oil, has aroused much interest. Judge Ryan has received numerous inquiries from California producers who have offered to deliver the oil here at no greater cost than it costs in California. The court will place this oil on all of the different kinds of clay soil in the county and determine its value in road construction.

May Sue The County.

Wm. McDonald, of New Era, threatens to sue Clackamas county for damages in the sum of \$2000. Several weeks ago in descending a hill near New Era, the load of lumber that was being hauled, shifted from its insecure position, and, striking the horses, caused a runaway, injured horses and a demolished wagon, besides slight injuries to Mr. McDonald, was the result. Mr. McDonald has presented the county court with a claim for \$2000 damages and unless a settlement is had, he promises to sue the county. The members of the county court have the claim under consideration, but it will probably be dismissed. In event of an suit, the county will charge McDonald with contributory negligence in not properly securing the load of lumber against such a mishap and with not taking other customary precaution for his own safety.

An improvement is reported in the condition of J. F. Montgomery, of this city, who for the last ten days has been troubled with an incessant attack of hiccoughing. Mr. Montgomery found relief for the first time Wednesday evening his condition prior to that time having been considered serious.

Fighting Local Option Measure.

The liquor dealers of Oregon City are conducting an aggressive fight against Prohibition as is proposed by Local Option to be voted on at the November election. A petition, addressed to the taxpayers of Clackamas county and protesting against the plan by which the county and not the precinct is made the unit in the fight, was circulated among the business men of this city Wednesday and Thursday. The signatures of more than fifty of the prominent business and professional men, representing many of the most substantial taxpayers in the county, were secured. Copies of the petition will be distributed in the county.
