## CLACKAMAS GIVES ROOSEVELT 2,000

Unofficial Returns From 35 of 37 Precincts—Prohibition Defeated by 1300.

Complete unofficial returns from 35 of 37 precincts in Clackamas County give Roosevelt 2600; Parker 667; Swallow 155; Debs 380; Watson 59. Roosevelt's majority in this county of 1903 will be slightly increased by a vote of Damascus and Beaver Creek precincts, yet to report. With three precincts to be heard from, Prohibition is defeated by a majority of 1302, vote being as follows: For Prohibition, 1124; against Prohibition, 2426. But two precincts in the county were carried for Prohibition. They were Garfield, which gave a majority of 20 and Viola where the anti-saloon people lead by four votes.
