In the circuit court Wednesday, Judge McBride granted two divorces as follows: W. A. Haskins vs. Estella N. Haskins; Minnie Belle Fanton vs. Henry R. Fanton. In the case of Gottfried Marquardt vs. Wm. Moldenhauer, being an action to recover judgment for \$195, alleged to be due on two promissory notes, the jury returned an unexpected verdict, awarding the defendant judgment against the plaintiff in the sum of \$226. The litigation resulted from a disagreement as to the management of a farm under a verbal contract and the defendant presented a counter claim for labor performed and claimed damages for harm done growing crops by cattle belonging to plaintiff.
