MAYOR SOMMER TAKES REINS.

Walter A. Dimick Elected Recorder.— Many Officers Retained.
Mayor Sommer presided at the first meeting of the newly elected city council Wednesday night. There was a large attendance of citizens at the meeting which was not without its surprises. By a vote of five to four the council tabled an ordinance providing for the repeal of the Southern Pacific perpetual franchise ordinance recently passed by that body. Those voting to table the ordinance were: Chapman, Justice, Koerner, Mason, Straight. In the vote, to table the ordinance, it will be seen that Alderman Justice has experienced a decidedly changed opinion within the last three weeks. On a number of occasions Mr. Justice, as the records will show, voted against the perpetual franchise ordinance and in the interests of the great majority of the people of Oregon City as expressed at a public indignation meeting several weeks ago. But on Wednesday night he joins the faithful four, making the required majority vote, and is instrumental in having promptly tabled almost before it had been read, an ordinance asking for the repeal of the Southern Pacific perpetual franchise ordinance.

A DRINK OF WATER.

Why It is a Good Plan to Take One Before Breakfast.
In the morning the stomach contains a considerable quantity of mucus, spread over and adherent to its walls. If food enters at this time the tenacious mucus will interfere to some extent with the direct contact between the food and the stomach necessary to provoke the secretion of gastric juice. A glass of water taken before breakfast passes through the stomach into the small intestines in a continuous and uninterrupted flow. It partially dissolves the stomach; it thins and washes out most of the tenacious mucus; it increases the fullness of the capillaries of the stomach directly if the water is warm and indirectly in a reactionary way if it is cold. Care must be taken not to take cold water when the circulation, either local or general, is so feeble as to make reaction improbable. We should not risk it in an advanced age nor in the feeble, whether old or young, nor should it be taken in local troubles like gastric catarrh. In these cases it is best to give warm or hot water. The addition of salt is very beneficial.—London Family Doctor.

If Quail Are Scarce, So Are Turkeys.
"I don't know whether you ever dotted it, but it's a fact just the same that whenever we have a year in which quail are scarce the same is true of turkeys," said a prominent meat dealer the other day. "Prolonged wet weather in the spring or in the early summer is fatal to young quail and turkeys alike. Both are extremely tender, and the weather has much to do with their successful rearing. I have watched this thing for years, and invariably a poor quail year means a scarcity of turkeys and high prices."—Youngstown Herald.
