TO MAKE PRECINCT THE UNIT.

Proposed Modification of Present Local Option Law.

A Salem dispatch Tuesday says: Local option by precincts only is the purpose of the bill introduced in the House today by Jayne, of Wasco, to amend the local option law enacted last June at the polls under the initiative amendment. In the Senate the bill will be favored by Hodson of Multnomah.

If this bill shall be enacted and shall stand in the courts, prohibition elections in counties as a whole and groups of precincts will be abolished. The number of electors needed to sign a petition for an election will be increased from 10 to 40 per cent of the registered voters of a precinct. Elections will be held in cities only in residence precincts, and after an election has been held the question of prohibition cannot be raised again in that precinct until two years thereafter. Every precinct voting must lie entirely within or without an incorporated town.

A residence precinct is defined as one in which at least one-half the frontage on the streets fronting thereon shall be occupied by private residences. The bill exempts breweries and wholesale liquor dealers and carries an emergency clause.
