COUNTY FRUIT INSPECTOR.

Each County to Have Own Fruit Inspec tor, According to Pending Bill.

An act providing for the appointme of county fruit inspectors, introduced by Representative Jayne, passed the lower ouse Monday afternoon, and as its provisions are of much local importance, a summary follows:

Section 1 provides that upon a petition of not less than 25 residents and fruit growers of any county, the county court shall appoint a county inspector who shall inspect the apple and other orchards and to enforce the laws applicable to the fruit industry and to the growing, handling and selling of fruit. fruit trees and nursery stock. The inspector to be appointed shall be certified to as competent by the district commissioner of the state board of horticulture, and shall hold his office during the pleasure of the county court.

Section 2 says that it shall be the duty of the state district commissioner to instruct the county official as, to the laws and quarantine regulations of this state.

According to Section 3, the inspector shall be paid by the county a sum not exceeding \$3 per day and his own personal expenses, for each day actually employed.

If for any reason a county fails to appoint an inspector, the inspector from the adjacent county may perform the services, and his compensation and expenses shall be charged against the county where the services have been performed.

The fifth section says that the state district commissioner shall hear and decide all appeals from the county inspectors in his district, and his decision shall have full force and effect until set aside by the courts of the state.

The remainder of the bill are amendments to sections 4178 and 4185 of the codes and statutes of Oregon, as com-The first piled by Bellinger and Cotton. provides for the election of a secretary of the state board of horticulture, at a salary not to exceed \$100 per month. The latter amendment relates to the powers and measures which the board shall take for the eradication of all fruit pests, diseases or fungus growth.
