WOULD SIMPLIFY TAX PAYING.

Assessor Nelson Has an Idea That Would Save Much Clerical Work.

"There should be a law enacted." stated Assessor Nelson in discussing the work of his office, "requiring the payment of taxes by the man in whose name the property is assessed, except in case, of course, property has been erroneously assessed. In this way, the need for sheriff's assessments would be largely dispensed with. As it now is, immediately following the listing of property on the assessment roll, the property owner can sell a portion of the tract before the tax is levied and collected and then a cumbersome amount of bookkeeping work is foisted on the sheriff's office or the assessor before the tax on that entire tract is collected. Such a law would relieve the two offices of a great amount of extra work and would leave the adjustment of the tax question between the

Assessor Nelson was in Portland Saturday and attended a conference between Secretary of State Dunbar, L. R. Webster and D. B. Sigler, county judge and assessor respectively for Multnomah county. The meeting was held for the purpose of arranging a form for the blank that will be used this year in taking the state census. It was decided to use a combination blank by which the census statistics and the military enrollment of the county can be placed on the same sheet, thereby simplifying the work of the assessors of the state. The blanks will not be ready for distribution among the assessors before the latter part of March and the work of assessing property will have to be deferred until that time,




