ORDINANCE NO-

An Ordinance to provide for the construction and repair of sidewalks on Main street between Eleventh street and the Basin in Oregon City.

Oregon City Does Ordain as Follows: Section 1. It is hereby made the duty of all owners of lands adjoining Main street in Oregon City between Eleventh street and the Basin to construct, reconstruct and maintain in good repair, the sidewalks in front of said lands, and all sidewalks to be constructed hereafter in front of the said lands by any of the said owners, shall be of concrete made in proportions of three parts of sand, four parts of washed gravel not to exceed one inch in its greatest diameter and one part of cement of standard brand. with a smooth hard surface finish not less than one-half inch thick to be made of one part cement and one part sand, mixed and laid according to plans and specifications to be furnished by the City Engineer. Any sidewalk hereafter to be constructed in front of said lands shall be of the even width of ten feet with a rise from the curb of one-fourth inch to the foot and with a concrete curb six inches thick on top, eight inches thick on the bottom and eighteen inches

Section 2. If the owner of my lot or part thereof fronting upon the said portion of Main street shall suffer any sidewalk along the same to become out of repair, it shall be the duty of the Street Commissioner to post a notice on the adjacent property, headed "NOTICE TO REPAIR SIDEWALK" in letters not less than one inch in length and said notice shall, in legible characters, direct the owner, agent or occupant of said property, immediately to repair the same in a good and substantial manner, and the Street Commissioner shall file with the Recorder, an affidavit of the posting of such notice, stating the date when and the place where the same is posted. The Recorder shall, upon receiving the affidavits of the Street Commissioner, send by mail a notice to repair said sidewalk to the owner (if known) of such property, or to the agent (if known) of the owner, and directed to the post-office address of such owner or agent, when such post-office address is known to the recorder, and if such post-office address be unknown to the Recorder, such notice shall be directed to such owner or agent at Oregon City, Oregon.
