Suspension Bridge Corner

W. G. Emery gives figures on chicken culture that are of interest. He has 21 Plymouth Rock pullets that during March laid 475 eggs. On two different days they laid 19 eggs. One day the laid 18 eggs after having laid 19 the day before. On two different days they laid 13 eggs, and this is the smallest number laid in any one day. This is certainly great for the number of hens.

Mr. Emery is very careful of the man ner in which he feeds his chickens; in the morning he feeds a mash composed of equal parts of shorts and cracked corn, to which is added a handful of meat meal, mixed with warm water or milk. At noon he feeds one quart of wheat, scattered in a litter in a scratching shed, and in addition he feeds fresh ground bone twice a week, all they can eat.-Corvallis Gazette.
