ORDINANCE NO.— (Concluded from Page 2.)
In that event this franchise shall be null and void as to such private property at the election of the owner of such private property.
Sec. 11. When and as soon as the said Oregon & California Railroad Company shall have filed in the office of the City Recorder of Oregon City its written acceptance of the rights, easements, privileges and obligations granted by this ordinance, and whenever and as soon as the contract authorized by Section four of this Ordinance shall have been executed by the parties as therein provided, then and in that case Ordinance No. 316 approved by the Mayor November 21, 1904, entitled, "An Ordinance Authorizing the Oregon and California Railroad Company, its lessee Successors and Assigns to construct, operate, and maintain a main track and certain side tracks in Railroad Avenue, in the City of Oregon City, Clackamas County, Oregon, and to authorize the construction and maintenance of team under-crossing on Third Street of said city under the tracks of said company, and pedestrian under-crossings at Fourth and Seventh Streets under said railroad tracks on Railroad Avenue aforesaid; and to authorize the Mayor and Recorder of said city to enter into a contract with the Southern Pacific Company, lessee of said Oregon & California Railroad Company for the construction and maintenance of said pedestrian crossings and team under-crossings, and to legalize the use and occupation of said Railroad Avenue by the Oregon & California Railroad Company, its lessee successors and assigns, in respect to the tracks and sidings heretofore constructed and maintained thereon," be and the same is hereby repealed.

ORDINANCE NO.—
An Ordinance assessing the probable cost of the improvement of Third Street of Oregon City, Oregon, from the East line of Main Street Easterly a distance of 179 feet and directing an entry of such assessment in the Docket of City Liens.
Oregon City Does Ordain as Follows:
Section 1. That whereas, the Council of Oregon City, having ascertained and determined that the probable cost of improving Third Street from the East line of Main Street Easterly a distance of 179 feet as provided by Ordinance No. 309, to be the sum of \$1468.20 and whereas, under the provisions of Section 85 of Chapter 13 of the Charter of Oregon City as amended, it is directed that one-third of the total cost of the improvements shall be paid from the permanent street "Improvement fund" and,
Whereas, one-third of the total probable cost of the improvement of said Third Street from the East line of Main Street Easterly a distance of 179 feet is the sum of \$489.41 and the remaining two-thirds of the total probable cost is \$978.79.
Now, Therefore, said sum of \$978.79 is hereby assessed to the several lots and parts of lots and tracts of land abutting on the portion of Third Street to be improved in the respective amounts set opposite the number and description thereof in Section 3, of this Ordinance as being benefitted by said Street improvement, in said amounts.

ORDINANCE NO.—
Section 2. The Recorder is hereby directed to enter a statement of the assessments hereby made in the Docket of City Liens and cause notice thereof to be published as provided by the City Charter.
Section 3.
Lot 3, Block 28, the following described portion of, to-wit: Beginning at the corner of Lots 3, 4, 5 and 6 of said Block, running thence Easterly along the line between Lots 3 and 4, 74 feet, thence Northerly parallel to the Westerly line of said Lot 3, 31.7 feet; thence Westerly parallel to the line between said Lots 3 and 4, 74 feet; thence Southerly along the line between Lots 3 and 6, 31.7 feet to the place of beginning.
