Peter Kern has filed in the probate court an answer to the petition recently filed by Columbus Parrish, one of the heirs of the Patsy Kern estate, requesting the removal of Kern as administrator of the estate, on the grounds that at the time of Kern's marriage to the decedent, he had a wife still living in Germany from whom he had not been divorced. In his answer filed this week, Kern exhibits a certified copy of a divorce decree that he obtained in the State of Wyoming from his first wife. This will probably have the effect of terminating the contest for the removal of Kern as administrator.

On the 18th inst the new laws affecting the fees to be paid for recording instruments went into effect. In the aggregate the effect is to reduce by about 20 per cent the fees that have heretofore prevailed. Under the new law, fees for the recording of instruments, and for entering and attesting satisfaction of mortgages on the margin of the record will be as follows: For each folio in all instruments, except chattel mortgages, twenty cents; for each folio in chattel mortgages including five, twenty cents; for five and including eight folio, one dollar; for each additional folio after eight, twenty cents; for each satisfaction on the margin of the record, twenty-five cents.
