MT. PLEASANT.

One of the most beautiful and historic places in the state of Oregon is Mt. Pleasant, less than a mile distant from central Oregon City. A glance over the beautiful fields and pretty homes, convinces one that nature has been more than partial to this sightly place, as she lies a vision of beauty in her venture of flowers, foliage and splendid fruits. The view is magnificent. The distant snow-capped mountains are made more grand by diversification, girdled with green and crowned with snow, they present a picture of perfect splendor. Mt. Pleasant was given her appropriate name by the late William Livingston Holmes in 1844 and includes "Rose Farm," a part of the Holmes donation claim, now owned by Mrs. Dan O'Neil and her sister, Miss Mary L. Holmes, and is one of the first homes in the state. The Hedges farm, originally the Archibald McKinlay claim, now owned by W. M. Ladd, of Portland, "Locust Farm," the original M. M. McCarter claim, now owned by Mrs. Elizabeth Warner and children. The S. S. White claim, now principally owned by W. B. Patton, the original Howell claim, now owned principally by A. Howland. The Samuel Vance claim, now the property of L. H. Andrews. Mt. Pleasant has always been noted for her hospitable homes some of which are now occupied by old pioneer families.
