GEORGE W. LAUTH IS HANGED.

Pays Penalty for Deliberate Murder of His Mistress in This City.

George W. Lauth was hanged at the state penitentiary at Salem yesterday for the murder of his mistress, Mrs. Leonore R.Jones in tthis city last September, Having been denied a new trial on appeal to the Supreme court and Governor Chamberlain having refused to commute the sentence to life imprisonment, although a petition, largely signed by Oregon City people was presented asking such action, the convicted murderer a few days ago addressed a pitiful letter to Circuit Judge T. A. McBride, urging the judge to in dorse his, Lauth's application for a commutation of sentence, but the trial judge declined to give his indorsement. In his letter to Judge McBride Lauth for the first time since committing the crime indicated a regret for his act. Regarding Lauth's conduct at the pen-

itentiary and the preparations for the \$27.33 execution, Thursday's Salem Statesman

34.65 had the following: "Ever since Lauth has been incarcerated within the walls of the state pris-17.50 on he has borne himself bravely and with a calmness and fortitude that has convinced all who have seen and conversed with him that he will march to the gallows unfalteringly and meet the fate that has been meted out to him. He has been resigned to his fate \$ 3.00 ever since the supreme court rendered 9.00 its opinion affirming the decree and judgment of thhe trial court and he has expressed his readiness and desire to die upon several occasions since that 3.75 time. In fact, he was asked at one time if it was his desire to have his sentence commuted to life imprisonment, whereupon he replied that it was not, as he preferred death to life-long im-1.50 prisonment in the penitentiary.


