SCHOLARSHIP AND ITS REWARD.

In his Harvard address, which touched upon several burning topics, President Roosevelt briefly referred to the striking contrast between the rewards of success in industry and those commanded by men and women who devote themselves to science, art, ed-ucation or scholarship generally. Of course, salaries in private life cannot be arbitrarily regulated, but Mr. Roosevelt is quite right in declaring that in business "nothing could be more healthy than an immense reduction in the money value of the exceptional prizes to be won." When we have succeeded in abolishing graft, shackling the cunning of "high finance," upon directors and proper protection of all trust funds, a great step will have been taken toward the change favored by Mr. Roosevelt.


