REDUCE THE DEBT

CLACKAMAS COUNTY OFFICERS MAKE GOOD SHOWING.

Jelly, collection of, sweepstakes, Grand Total of County's Obligations Is Being Cut Down and Expenses Curtailed.

> That the indebtedness of Clackamas county during the last year has been reduced \$33,786.39 is shown in the semi-annual reports of the county officers published on another page of this issue

> On September 20, 1904, the total outstanding warrants against the county, together with the estimated accrued interest, aggregated \$123,001 .-02, while the total of these two items on the 30th ult was only \$89,214.63.

> These figures, compared with the financial condition of the county six months ago, show an improvement of about \$2000 in the amount of outstanding indebtedness, at that time.

> A saving of more than \$6000 in the current expenses of the county has been effected during the last twelve months. For the year ending September 30th, last, it cost only \$34,-288.59 for the administration of the county government as against \$40,-904.67 for the corresponding period a year befor.
