Mr. Gebhart is putting an addition to his home.

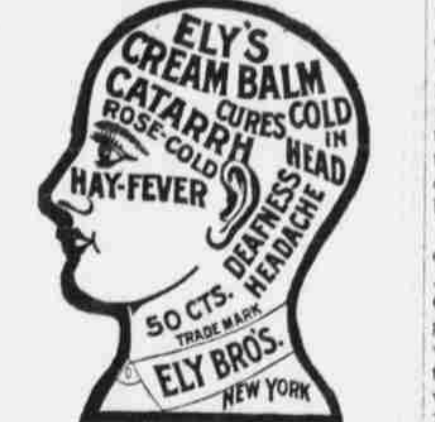
Frog-pond school house and Grange hall have put on a new roof.

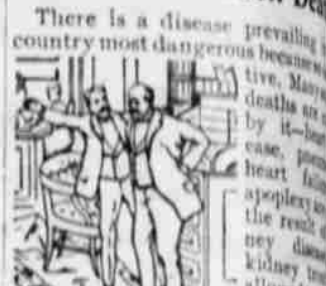
