### TO BUILD THE LINE

ELECTRIC RAILWAY TO CONNECT PORTLAND AND SALEM.

Surveyors in the Field and Circuitous Route Will Penetrate Rich Farming Section.

Salem, Or., Oct. 9.—It was learned late tonight, and it may be definitely stated on first-class authority, that the electric railway line will be built between this city and Portland within the ensuing year. The preliminary survey of the proposed route, which will be circuitous and traverse the richest farming sections of the Lower Valley between the two points and touch the principal intermediate points is now being made and a crew of surveyors will start out in a few days to make the actual survey.

The interests behind the project are those which own and operate the Citizens Light & Traction Company of this city, and the Portland Consolidated Railway Company. Powerful Eastern capital has made this first move of a contemplated project to stretch a line of railway from Portland to the south so far as Eugene, with laterals tapping the principal interior points along the line. The same interests also own the Eugene plant and extensive water-power rights on the Santiam for the development of sufficient power to operate the system.
