In the replies thus far received the least popular of the proposed amendments are those giving the people the power to discharge any public officer by vote at a special election, and another for allowing the enactment of laws for the election of officers by proportional or minority representation...

In my opinion, the greatest inducement for an officer to perform good service is his belief that he will again be elected, and not the fear that he will be bounced if he is derelict of duty. Indorsement of this amendment, however, is had by a number of other voters, principal among them being W. C. Bristol, of Portland, who writes: "Your No. 2 on page 3 of your folder is substantially the same practice as is common with the British government of taking a vote of confidence, as to which no public-spirited man seeking office could have any reasonable objection. Your illustration in your argument is very apt, but you could have as well applied it to the colonies rather than to have confined it to the House of Commons. I was in Victoria last year when a vote of confidence was taken by the Board of Assemblymen, which is the same thing in that country as a governing City Council. The object you seek can be enlarged upon also from numerous instances in Europe."
