ALFALFA AIDS DAIRYING.

Growing of This Foodstuff is Strongly Recommended.

In a letter to the Enterprise, Paul Shoup, assistant general freight agent for the Harriman lines in Oregon, writes as follows: "After a thorough investigation our company believes that the dairy in-

dustry of the Willamette Valley can be made more profitable, and the production greatly increased, through the growing of alfalfa.

While many attempts have been made in the valley to grow alfalfa, and in some places with commercial success, yet the valley can hardly be classed as a producer of alfalfa as a crop. Therefore the Southern Pacific Company proposes, in different parts of the Willamette Valley, to plant 20 or more tracts in alfalfa and to endeavor to cultivate it successfully.

"The object to be attained is, first, to determine under what conditions and in what sections of the valley alfalfa can be grown successfully; and second, to give as wide publicity as possible to the results obtained, that farmers interested may have the value of our experience where desired.

Mr. W. W. Cotton, who has had much practical experience in alfalfa culture, is preparing a pamphlet on

The Clackamas County Court has made it annual apportionment of the road fund to the various road districts of the city. The total amount apportioned was \$30,000. During the year 1906, Clackamas county will expend an immense amount of money in the improvement of roads and the repair and construction of bridges throughout the County.

Unless emergencies arise, no further appropriations will be made until next year. Under the charter of Estacada, the town is entitled to all of the road tax collected within its boundaries. Milwaukie secures 50 per cent of its tax, and Oregon City and Canby 60 per cent of the amounts collected The apportionment by districts, to-
