Business Transacted at Regular April Term.

Be it remembered, That at a regular term of the County Court of Clackamas County, held in the Court House in Oregon City, for the purpose of transacting county business in April the same being the time fixed by law for holding a regular term of said court, present Hon. Thos. E. Ryan, county judge, presiding; T. B. Killen and Wm. Brobst, Commissioners, when the following proceedings were had, to-wit:

In the matter of Supervisor's reports examined and allowed.

In the matter of the petition to improve McCord Hill:

Ordered that W. G. Randall, Supervisor, take charge of the work.

In the matter of scraper for road district No. 5:

Ordered that said scraper be bought and shipped to Boring.

In the matter of the Newell Creek bridge:

Ordered that court ask for plans and bids to build a bridge across said creek.

In the matter of petition to improve road from Jonsrud's place to Lindstrom place:

Ordered that W. A. Hall, supervisor, use \$125 of district money and that John Straus, supervisor, use \$25 for part of road in his district.

Ordered that the rate of toll be as follows: Batch automobile \$2.00; each four-wheeled vehicle drawn by one span or yoke, \$2.00; each additional span or yoke attached to vehicle, 40 cents; each two or four wheeled vehicle drawn by one horse or mule, \$1.25; each saddle horse or mule with rider, 75c; each horse or mule with pack, 40c; each horse or mule loose, 15c; each head of sheep or goat or hogs, 2c. It is further ordered that the rates of toll from the western terminus to points near Mt. Hood, shall be one full toll for round trip, all tolls to be collected at toll gate.
