

WAGES ARE RAISED

BOTH PAPER MILLS GRANT AN ADVANCE.

Means An Increase In Annual Payroll of City of About \$45,000.

Wednesday evening the management of both the Willamette Pulp & Paper Company and the Crown-Columbia Pulp & Paper Company announced a voluntary advance of 25 cents per day to all men in their employ who are now receiving \$1.75 and \$2.00 per day. This advance applies to the wages of about 500 men and means an increase in the wage payroll at Oregon City of about \$3750 per month, or about \$45,000 per year.

This voluntary advance in wages, which contributes so substantially to the material prosperity of the community, is welcome news to Oregon City people. This is the second advance in wages that has been made by the paper mills here within the last few years and in a large measure accounts for the harmonious conditions that prevail between these institutions and the workmen.

Monday evening forty of the men employed in the machine room, left the mill when their demand for an advance in wages, that had been made in the absence of Mr. Lang, was not granted. Wednesday afternoon, after a conference with Mr. Lang, the men returned to their work, since they explained that they had struck with the understanding that the manager was in the city and had entirely ignored their request for more wages. The raise that has been granted has been contemplated by the company for some time, it is claimed by a representative of the company.
