BOTH PAPER MILLS GRANT AN ADVANCE.

Means An Increase in Annual Payroll of City of About \$45,000.

Wednesday evening the management of both the Willamette Pulp & Paper Company and the Crown-Columbia Pulp & Paper Company announced a voluntary advance of 25 cents per day to all men in their employ who are now receiving \$1.75 and \$2.00 per day. This advance applies to the wages of about 500 men and means an increase in the wage payroll at Oregon City of about \$3750 per month, or about \$45,000 per year.

This voluntary advance in wages, the material prosperity of the community, is welcome news to Oregon City people. This is the second advance in wages that has been made by the paper mills here within the last few years and in a large measure accounts for the harmonious conditions that prevail between these institutions and the workmen.
