WILL STANDARD OIL CONTROL IT?

Preparations are being made by the Treasury Department and the Department of Agriculture to issue two volumes on denatured alcohol.

However the consumer will get the benefit of a new and cheap source of light, heat and power. It is especially in this connection that the forthcoming pamphlet of the Agricultural Department will be of very general interest.

Experiments are now being made by the Agricultural Department with what is known as the "stock potato," which is the source from which much alcohol is manufactured abroad.
