COUNCIL TURNS DOWN LIBRARY PROPOSITION

PRACTICALLY REJECTS ORDINANCE BY POSTPONING CONSIDERATION INDEFINITELY.

WILLING TO AID PRIVATE ONE

But Had No Money For Public Institution for All the People—Referendum Offer Unnoticed.

At an adjourned meeting, Wednesday night, the city council turned down the proposition for a city library or the alternative of a referendum on the question, by postponing further consideration indefinitely.

The council committee that had met with the library association committee Tuesday evening, reported the proposition presented to the other committee—that of presenting before the council the subject of levying a 1/2-mill tax for the first year of the existence of the library, the same to be organized under a private corporation or association which would take charge. After the first year the subject might be brought at a regular election before the people and their sanction thus be given.

The association committee was reported as not willing to agree to this as they wished the mayor to appoint a city board to have charge of the same under the name of the city.

Many persons were heard on both sides. Some showed plainly that they did not see the need of such an institution in Oregon City.

Judge Ryan spoke in a forceful manner of the good which would be rendered through such an institution but stuck fast to the fact that it should be a city organization.

J. U. Campbell replied, and argument and wit flowed freely between the two and was the cause of some amusement. Mr. Campbell spoke against the forming and establishing a library of any sort in this city.

Deputy District Attorney Schuebel put up some good arguments in favor of a library and pointed out the need of such an organization—a place where the children, young men and ladies and the older ones would find a suitable place to spend some of their spare moments and evenings and where they would come in contact with the best books and literature of the day.

Mr. Schuebel proposed that a referendum be taken, the library association to pay half the total expense, about \$60, and the council the other half.

After all the arguments had been presented, by mutual consent the library problem, which has caused so much anxiety to many, was postponed indefinitely by council.

The ordinance providing for the licensing and regulating of billiard, pool and card rooms, and to prevent minors under the age of 18 from frequenting the same, was read and ordered published and will come up for second reading and final passage at a special meeting of said council to be held Wednesday, December 26.

The dispute over sidewalks on Fifth and Water streets and also whether there should be a 6 or 4 foot sidewalk on Fifth street was referred to the street committee.

The council had recently named a committee of three members to take charge of circulating a subscription paper which would give a chance to the people of Oregon City and vicinity to show appreciation of the faithful services of the late George J. Hanlon, night police officer, who was murdered by Outlaw Smith, while Hanlon was in the performance of his official duty. The subscription taken up by the committee has reached the amount of \$270 and Councilman Knapp was appointed at this meeting to present the donation to the widow of the late officer as a Christmas gift from her friends.

A warrant of \$1012.92 was ordered paid to Contractor Mihilstin in part payment on contract for construction of sewer in sewer district No. 5. The warrant was ordered paid on an estimate of the city engineer.

The complaint that the woodshed of Charles Nash, at Seventh and J. Q. Adams streets, was about to collapse and endangered the lives of pedestrians, was referred to the committee on health and police.

ORDINANCE NO.—

An ordinance providing for the licensing and regulating of billiard, pool and card rooms, and to prevent minors under the age of eighteen years from frequenting the same.

Oregon City does ordain as follows:

Sec. 1. Any person or firm conducting a card room, billiard room or pool room, shall in addition to the license required to be paid for billiard tables, and pool tables as provided in section 9, of Ordinance No. 207 pay to the City treasurer the sum of \$25.00 per quarter, and upon presenting the receipt for the sum to the recorder, accompanied by a bond in the sum of \$500, with two sufficient sureties, to be ap-

proved by the mayor, conditioned that they will not permit any unlawful or disorderly conduct, or allow any minor under the age of eighteen years to frequent or loiter in or about their place of business, and that they will not have any room or rooms in connection with their place of business, where any game is played, contained or partitioned off in any manner whatever, and that they will not allow any game or games to be played excepting in a main public room, and that they will maintain no curtains, partitions or other obstructions to the plain view of the interior of said room from any person passing along on the street. The said recorder will issue such license provided that this section shall not apply to saloons or private clubs having billiard rooms; provided further, that if the person or firm having such license shall be convicted of a violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance, the fine, costs and disbursements of the action together with the costs of keeping of such persons in jail may be recovered by Oregon City out of the sureties upon such bond.

Sec. 2. It shall be unlawful for any person or firm conducting a card room, billiard room or pool room, harbor, permit or suffer any minor under the age of eighteen years to loiter or remain in such card room, billiard room or pool room, or to engage in any game of cards, dice-throwing or other game of chance, billiard, pool, bagatelle or other game in such card rooms, billiard rooms or pool rooms, either for amusement or otherwise.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful for any minor under the age of eighteen years to frequent, loiter or remain in any card room, billiard room, pool room, or to engage in any game of cards, dice-throwing or other game of chance, billiards, pool, bagatelle or other games in any card room, billiard room, or pool room, either for amusement or otherwise.

Sec. 4. It shall be unlawful for any person or firm conducting any card room, billiard room, or pool room, to keep the same open or to permit any person, except employees, to remain in or to permit any person to engage in any game of cards, billiards, pool, dice-throwing or any other game of chance or other game for amusement or otherwise, after the hour of eleven o'clock p. m. of any day, or before the hour of six o'clock a. m. of any day.

Sec. 5. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance opening or conducting a card room, billiard room, or pool room, without first having obtained a license as required by section one of this ordinance or violating any of the conditions required in said bond as provided in said section No. one, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof before the recorder or mayor shall be fined in any sum not less than ten dollars or more than fifty dollars, or by imprisonment in the City jail for not less than five days nor more than twenty days or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Sec. 6. The City Council shall have power to revoke the license provided for in this ordinance for any cause which in their judgment is sufficient.

Read first time and ordered published at an adjourned meeting of the Council of Oregon City, held December 12th, 1906, and to come up for second reading and final passage at special meeting of said Council to be held Wednesday, December 26th, 1906, at 8 o'clock p. m. of said day.
